TO-DAY'S DISPATCHES.

EASTERN.

New York, 22.—Henry Williams, colored, was hanged yesterday, for committing an outrage upon the person of Margaret A. Stephens, near Carroll, August 19th, 1895.

Dexter, Maine, 22.—Last evening, J. W. Carro, treasurer of the Dexter savings bank, was found locked in the vault, handcuffed, and with a rope around his neck. He was senseless and dead. He has several bad wounds in his forehead. The robber obtained less than \$100, and it is supposed he murdered the treasurer because he would not open the safe.

New Orleans, 22.—Judge Whiteaker has refused a new trial in the Anderson case.

Galena, Ill., 22.—The jury in the Rands murder trial, after being locked up for 48 hours, returned a verdict at 4 o'clock this morning. Finding the prisoner guilty of murder, and fixing his punishment at imprisonment for life. Rands is the desperado who has committed some half a dozen blood-curdling murders, the last being that of a policeman in St. Louis, who was attempting to arrest him. His conduct throughout the trial has been reckless and obscene.

A Back Achre.
WASHINGTON, 22.—The signal service officer at Katter's reported a German bark ashore yesterday, and that the men were clinging to the rigging, with the sea running so high that assistance could not be given. A body, supposed to be that of the captain, was washed ashore.

Paris Exposition.—American Department.
The freight capacity of the government ships Constitution, Supply and Yosemite being insufficient to accommodate the goods offered for the Paris Exposition, the ship Portsmouth has been placed at the disposal of Commissioner General McCormick. All the space in the American department has been assigned.

A Government Defaulter.
BOSTON, 22.—Thomas P. Cheney, superintendent of the New England mail service, is charged with defrauding the government by falsifying to false vouchers for service never rendered; with establishing postal routes in New Hampshire for the benefit of his friends; with granting his chief clerk illegal favors, and certifying to vouchers unfurnished by him, and allowed him to draw after he had left the service; with being absent from duty, and with general inefficiency. Congress will investigate.

FOREIGN.

Great Britain.
LONDON, 22.—The Daily Telegraph says: There is hardly any hope for Earl Russell. He suffers from acute bronchitis, and has lost the use of one of his eyes. Other papers, however, do not admit that his condition is such as to cause immediate anxiety.

The Channel Squadron is directed to call at Malta for orders.

A correspondent at Vienna states that the intention to immediately mobilize a portion of the army has been abandoned, but the Austro-Hungarian delegation will be asked to vote eighty millions of florins in order that government may have means in readiness in case mobilization should become necessary.

A special dated Constantinople, Wednesday, reports that the Czar telegraphed that the Russians will occupy Constantinople if the Turks continue to delay signing the terms of peace, which include the cession of Armenia and the surrender of the Turkish fleet.

The Porte hastens to subscribe to the Russian conditions of peace, which virtually abolish Turkish domination in Europe, except in the immediate neighborhood of Constantinople.

The Porte holds constant cabinet councils without any result.

The Times and Daily Telegraph both regard the situation as very unsatisfactory. The Daily Telegraph says nothing could go well darker than the prospects.

A well informed Vienna correspondent affirms that Saffet Pasha still hesitates to sign General Ignatieff's conditions defining the eastern and southern limits of Bulgaria, and says the conditions also, despite the denial of the Agency House, possess the expansion principle of the entire Muscovite population. The idea of the Sultan's withdrawal to Broussa is again mooted at Constantinople. It is positively maintained, despite the statements in the British Parliament that arrangements between England and Russia are by no means perfect, that the announcement of the Muscovite intention to occupy Constantinople has caused the whole affair to enter upon a new phase, and that in consequence the British squadron has again returned to Princes Islands. General Ignatieff's dragonism is at Constantinople pressing the Turks to come to a speedy decision.

The Kaiser War.
Advices from Capetown, Feb. 21st, via Madeira, say the Kaiser war continues to be approaching and Elr Burke Frere, governor and commander-in-chief of Cape Colony, and the minister have had difference regarding military affairs, and the ministry were dismissed.

Station Withdrawn.
The amount of billion withdrawn from the Bank of England on balance to-day is £25,000.
