### LOCAL BRIEFS.

### WESTERN MARKET LETTER.

Special Correspondence.  
Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 11.—Cattle receipts last week were larger than expected, nearly 60,000 head, and the market on range cattle held about steady. Stockers and feeders closing the week 10 cents higher. Some high class yearlings from the panhandle sold at 3.00 to 4.00, and choice Colorado yearlings sold at 4.00. A feature of the week was the maintenance by country grades in the face of lower prices for fed steers. However, packers were active in putting some all week, and were willing to take more, as shown by the strong close of the week on fed steers account of smaller receipts.

Thursday and Friday, killing steers from the range sold at 3.25 to 3.75, while country grades sold around 3.00, except for the choice yearlings mentioned above. Cows sold at 2.50 to 3.00, while some choice Colorado cows at 3.00. Packers at 2.00 to 2.50. Cattle supply today is again liberal, and range and packers are barely steady in fed grades, while stockers and feeders are strong and active. Some of the heavy feeders have stayed out thus far this fall, small operators taking the bulk of the trade. The big men begin to think they have made a mistake, and many of them are trying to complete arrangements for putting something on feed for the spring or summer market. This has made a strong stocker and feeder market for the last few weeks, and indicates that the general feeling in the market regarding future cattle markets is optimistic.

Sheep receipts last week 24,000, supply today 6,000. The market advanced 10 to 15 cents on sheep last week, and is 25 to 30 cents on yearlings and lambs. Trade is active today at strong prices, and some new figures are being established. San Luis valley yearlings sold at 6.00 today, 4 points, while some heavy weights sold at 6.50 to 6.00 last week. Fed western lambs sold at 3.15 to 3.00, and fancy ewes have sold up to 4.50 lately, and choice lambs would bring about 7.00. Packers make every effort to secure concessions from the present high range, and are occasionally successful, but the market immediately recovers and the situation is strong nearly all the time. Feeding lambs sold at 3.00 to 3.50 last week, and a number of consignments of goats at 2.25 to 2.50. Kids at 5.00 to 5.50.

## HE USED A KNIFE TO DEFEND WOMEN.

J. A. Robinson of Fillmore Charged With Assaulting One Sid Harris.

LATTER WAS TOO FAMILIAR.

Was Sparring Former's "Cousins" When He Objected With a Deadly Weapon.

When two certain citizens of Fillmore returned to their respective homes, they will have to make certain explanations with reference to their conduct while sojourning in the Utah metropolis, otherwise known as Salt Lake City.

Their names are J. A. Robinson, said to be a stockman married and well to do, and his friend who gave the name of Ray—initials not known, who is also said to be a married man.

The whole affair has to do with paying too much attention to a couple of females known to the police as Thelma Harrington and Cecil Rose, which attention led up to a serious cutting affair which occurred on Tuesday night at the Wyoming roominghouse. The man on the receiving end of the cutting is Sid Harris, who has been living at the Spokane roominghouse, 72 west Second South street, and Robinson is the man accused of doing the cutting.

He has not been arrested; at least he has not been up to a late hour this afternoon. Robinson is a jurymen in the federal court and if he fails to show up tomorrow morning a bench warrant will probably be issued for him.

The "girls" and also Ray have disappeared, but Harris is in his room nursing five ugly cuts inflicted on his head and neck.

LANDLADY'S STORY.  
According to the story told by the landlady of the Wyoming house, Robinson and Ray have been there some time. The females have been there too, but were introduced by Robinson as his cousins.

Tuesday night the landlady heard a row in the hallway and saw Harris and another young man with the two women. She called upon Mr. Robinson to stop the noise. He emerged from his room clad only in his nightgown. When he saw his "cousins" with the men he made a rush at them. During the trouble that followed he slashed Harris five times with a knife, cutting an artery in Harris' neck. Robinson and the women then went up stairs and locked all of them left, since which time nothing has been seen of them.

DEMANDED EXPLANATION.  
It was reported this morning that Harris had to do some explaining to his wife when she demanded to know what he was doing with the two women involved. It is said that his reply was: "Oh, I have got to explain all that again!" And strange to say, the remark was "sufficiently" explained.

It was reported this morning that Harris' injuries, while bad enough, are not regarded as fatal, and he will probably recover in the due course of time. The idea that the man who did the cutting is not the one referred to, but someone who gave that name, is not received favorably in police circles. But the police are at work on the case, and hope to soon locate the fellow who used the knife.
