CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

The Senate land committee reported favorably on the bill incorporating the Salt Lake and Colorado River railway. The incorporators are A. R. Baldwin and others.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 23.—Houston introduced a bill incorporating the Arkansas Valley and Rocky Mountain Railway company with a grant right of way for a route from the mouth of the Arkansas river, via Little Rock to the foot of the Rocky Mountains; thence to San Luis park and San Juan to the Rio Colorado in Utah; and thence by the most practicable route to San Francisco. Also a branch from the Arkansas river to meet the Atlantic and Pacific railroad near the boundary between Texas and the Indian Territory. Among the incorporators are B. F. Mann and Valney D. Moody, of California.

EASTERN DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON, 23.—The drift of the discussion in the British Parliament by Earl Derby and others on the Alabama claims, creates some surprise here, as it was generally understood that England was favorable to an amicable settlement. The position assumed by our government in the late note of Secretary Fish to Earl Granville remains unchanged, and nothing that may occur, either in Parliament or the British Cabinet will be likely to disturb it.

New York, 23.—The boiler of the Trenton rolling mill, Jersey City, exploded to-day, destroying the blacksmith shop and a portion of the main building. Five men were injured, and Hughes the boiler tender, missing.

Henry C. Bowen publishes a card concerning the imputations of the Tribune, that he was interested at one time in the general order business. He admits signing a letter, by which there was an agreement to pay himself and associates thirty per cent of the gross receipts of the general order business. The Tribune charges that he wrote the letter sanctioning the agreement; his defense is that he did all this for his associates, and that he did not himself make any money out of it.

General Frank Blair was called to testify against Judge Barnard to-day. He said he met Judge Barnard at the Astor house, and in a loose conversation about the Erie and Union Pacific railway cases, the Judge said he had run New York for one of the blackguards, meaning Judge Barnard, and that he would do so for another referring to Briggs.

The interior department is preparing instructions permitting testimony as to whether or not the land is situated. The secretary has promulgated a decision that adverse claims in mineral lands under the law of the United States, are not subject to the provisions of the act of March 3, 1871, which requires that the land be situated.

In the speech of Kendal, of Nevada, in the House to-day, on irrigating desert lands, he gave a general account of the facilities needed for irrigation, such as arid lands, wells, etc.

The "Young Men's" Association have endorsed the bill introduced in Congress for increased pensions to soldiers and sailors who have lost both their eyes, legs, arms, feet or hands. They state there are in the United States 251 soldiers who have lost both eyes, 116 both legs, 11 who have lost both feet, 5 who have lost both arms, 2 who have lost both legs and arms, and 16 who have lost both arms and a leg. The increase asked for by the bill, will only add \$15,000 to the pension appropriation.

The Times says it is rumored that the prosecution of Wm. F. Weld & Co., of Boston and New York, for alleged frauds in the revenue, has been compromised by paying \$500,000.

It is reported that John C. Kleeber, whose establishment in Hookman street was the scene of the torpedo explosion last Fall, has been indicted by the grand jury. Henry Brown has sued Kleeber for \$5,000 damages for the loss of his son by the explosion.

HARTFORD, 23.—To-day, a man named Clark, in Cold Spring, Mass., by the most foolish carelessness with a loaded gun, shot and killed his sister, aged 23 years, and wounded her daughter six years old, and that amputation of the arm was necessary.

CHICAGO, 23.—Seven men were injured, one it is feared fatally, by the falling of a portion of the wall of Little's grocery store, which they were clearing away.

The cause of woman's rights has gained a point, by the passage, by the Legislature of the State of Ohio, of a bill providing that women shall be eligible to persons freedom in the selection of their occupation, profession or employment.

The governor has approved the bill, and it becomes a law July 1st. Under the provisions of the bill, women shall be eligible to any office and may practice as lawyers.

CINCINNATI, 23.—A dispatch from John Whitney, circus manager, says that a woman shot by James C. Davis, in Madison house yesterday, was his wife, Whitney's wife.

St. Louis, 23.—Dr. W. A. Johnson, convicted in the criminal court of manslaughter in the second degree, for procuring an abortion on Ann E. Magill, about a year ago, is sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

St. Louis, 23.—Trains on the Bellville and Southern Illinois railroad have been stoned and the lives of passengers endangered by a gang of scoundrels, near Pinksville on Thursday night two men were arrested

in the act and while being searched by the City Marshal one of them stabbed him, inflicting a wound thirteen inches long, whereupon the Marshal shot the desperado dead.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 24.—Slough, the wife murderer, committed suicide in jail at Richmond, Ky., on Monday, by hanging himself to the top bar of the door of his cell with a rope made of a towel and two pocket-handkerchiefs. He left a note saying he had already brought shame enough on his family and would not add to it the shame of a public execution. He said his wife had done him personal injury and deserved the death she met at his hands.

CHARLESTON, S. C., 24.—Arrests of parties charged with murder, have still been going on during the past week in Clarion and Chester counties.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, 24.—The Observer says the second note of Earl Granville in regard to the Alabama claims is most friendly and conciliatory in tone, but states explicitly that England is unable to submit to the question of the admissibility of the claims for indirect damages to the Board of Arbitrators at Geneva. The Observer describes the dispatch as very lengthy.

PARIS, 24.—A duel was fought yesterday between Royal of the Pays newspaper and Richardet of the Courrier. The latter was wounded in the chest.

The Committee of Initiative reported unfavorably to the Assembly on the proposal to raise the state of siege in Paris.

LONDON 24.—A dispatch from Cherbourg announces the arrival there this afternoon of the Queen and suite, on their way to Berlin via Paris.

The Queen will politely decline to meet Thiers, and will continue her journey to Berlin as privately as possible.

Female Prize Fight—One Thousand Dollars a Side.

About thirty days ago there landed in Akron, by the way of the Erie Railway, a party of eight, six males and two females, and were met at the depot by two men, evidently of the party. Carriages were quickly provided, and the party with their baggage mysteriously moved for some point in the country in a southward direction. A few days ago our reporter heard of the party and succeeded in getting an interview with them. They are sports from New York City, and are engaged in training two young ladies for a general prize fight for \$1,000 a side, and which will shortly take place, they think, at some place easy of access in England. The young ladies are of foreign nationality, having arrived in this country at an early age, and are noted for their cleanliness and propriety; having thrashed everything in their immediate neighborhood for years, and both being a little jealous of their laurels, have agreed to meet within the rules of the prize ring, and to abide by the rules of the referee, and to have a prize of \$1,000 a side, and which will shortly take place, they think, at some place easy of access in England.

The ladies are in the hands of experienced trainers, and the following is the order of their exercises: In the morning at 6 o'clock they get up and drink a cup of tea and eat a piece of brown bread; then they wash and dress in their morning dress, and put on their costumes, heavy soled shoes, and dog-trot with the trainer for five miles. They then bathe, and are rubbed down in the most approved style, and permitted to rest in a room of their own. At 9 o'clock they breakfast, usually on mutton chops, brown bread, baked potatoes, and coffee. No butter is allowed except in the form of a glass of butter, and then go to sparring or striking the sand-bag. This exercise lasts about thirty minutes, when the trainer steps up and they have two hours of boxing. Then a bath and the usual rubbing down, and then their dinner, which is pretty much the same as breakfast, a beefsteak or mutton chop, potatoes and coffee. 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
