Texas clubwomen are more than usually intelligent in their interest in the laws that govern them. They have been reading and commenting on a pamphlet written by a member of the Texas legislature, on the defects of the laws of the state, the chapter on rights of married women interesting them especially. A married woman in Texas has no property of her own under the law. Her husband may collect her earnings, spend her inheritance, gamble away her estate. A court decision is quoted to prove that a man may even draw his wife's money out of the bank, as her manager.

"A study of this opinion will show that the wife has even less authority over her money than any other property, and incidentally that she cannot draw her own funds out of the bank, although placed there by her before marriage. A case in point came under the writer's own notice in which a woman with several dependent children had been temporarily deserted by a lazy, drunken husband. She owned a rickety sewing machine, and attempted to do plain sewing. Seeing that it was necessary to get a better machine, she purchased one on the installment plan and banked her money in small savings toward the payment. Before the machine was paid for the husband returned, and checked when the machine agent called, he waited until about the time for the next payment and then forestalled it by going to the bank and procuring the entire deposit. Then he proceeded to have a good old time and make another temporary disappearance. The consequences were that the woman lost the machine, being unable to meet the payment rate. This much-abused wife would have appealed to the divorce courts if she had had the money to pay a lawyer and costs. Probably this is the kind of 'gradual emancipation' referred to by the legislator who killed in the committee the bill proposing to give to the wife the management of the separate property."

In Woman's World.

A woman's neck is, as many defects as the face and if I could only make women realize that many defects of both face and neck could be prevented by intelligent care we would have fewer complaints and see many more beautiful necks and complexions. The neck frequently shows the evidence of age before the face. Little tell-tale wrinkles in front and hollows back of the ears, long lines at the sides, a dark ring around the neck, the double and sometimes triple chin, are not beautiful to gaze upon, or welcome to those who possess them. Let all of these could be largely prevented. Tight stocks are accountable for many of the lines at the side. The carriage of the head, and even one's position when sleeping, has much to do with forming a double chin.

The head should be carried erect when walking. When reading or sewing the chin should never be dropped on the chest, but the book or work should be held in a position that will allow the chin to be held moderately high.

Even in sleeping it is not necessary to lie with the chin on the chest, but lie with the chin raised.

Bathing with very cold water will help to keep it firm, and if you are foolish enough to get a double chin it can be removed, but it is wiser not to get one.

Deep breathing in a loose gown before an open window every morning will help to keep the neck firm and expand the chest as well as improve the health.

Massage will greatly improve a scrawny neck and the lines at the side and prevent the hollows back of the ears, when taken in time. I know all these little attentions take time,
