Logan, Oct., 29 .- There was organized at the Brigham Young college last week a society that promises to be of great importance to that institution and to the Church generally. The name of the society is the Brigham Young college Society of American Aacheology

and its object is to promote a system-atic study of American archeology as it relates to the authenticity of the Book of Mormon. So far as known there has been no systematic, contin-uous effort made by any Church organ-ization to study ancient American ruins from a Book of Mormon standpoint. This the society proposes to do.
