Secretary Boutwell visited the Stock Exchange to-day and made a short speech, in substance to the effect that he should faithfully collect the revenues and apply the surplus, after paying the expenses of the government, to the reduction of the national debt. He said he should introduce economy in the department, and that all operations should be open to the public gaze; and he should endeavor to administer the finances without embarrassing the business of the country.
