The promoters of the exposition, through the friendly aid and cooperation of the heads of the several departments of the national government, have secured very comprehensive and interesting exhibits from our sister nations, available from Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Philippines. These different exhibits show the types of men, their methods of life and character, together with the distinctive national products of the different countries of the globe from which they came.

Villages of aboriginal native habitations were constructed, and the surroundings and the social and domestic life of Cuba and the Philippines have been graphically portrayed. Besides these, there are, of course, exhibits calculated to demonstrate the value of the various products of the various nations, and the possibilities of these new American colonies, with representative animal and plant life also shown.
