#### THE TRIP NORTH.

In our last issue, we briefly noticed the return of Presidents Young and Kimball and their friends to this city, from a trip to Bear Lake Valley; since that, we have been fur- CLARK, wite of Isaac Groo, aged nished with the reporter's notes of each day's travel.

Thursday, 19 h :- Rolled out of Franklin at 6 a.m. It rained till noon, and continued in broken showers throughout the day. We made the mouth of the Pioneer kanyon, in Bear River Lake Valley, at 9 p.m., bated our animals a short time, and resumed our journey through mud and mire, and reached Paris, Richland county, at 3 a.m. of the 20th.

Friday, 20th:- The weather wet, cloudy and uncomfortable. Paris is situated at the Terms --- \$6 per Anna mouth of North Twin creek, has thirty-four log houses; is laid out in a low place along the banks of North Twin creek, which runs must be handed in by Noon through an extensive willow patch. The distance from Franklin to the mouth of Pioneer kanyon, in Bear River Lake Valley, is 36 miles, and from that point to Paris, 12 miles. Marriage notices. There Twin creek is supplied by a large spring, and notices of Deaths. the amount of running water is only varied by the melting snows and heavy rains. It is a large kanyon stream, and calculated to supply rich loam, and well adapted to cereal crops, roots, etc. About one mile from this settlement there is a large patch of hay ground, extending 20 miles north and south, and 10 miles east and west. The climate is well adapted to hardy fruits of every kind. The hills are covered with fine grasses, and promises well 1 for grazing. Fish abundant in the lake. Saturday, 21st .- At half-past eight a.m. we rolled out of Paris, to visit the infant settlements southward. We passed New Haven, which has since been named St. Charles, and bated our animals at Fish Haven, about 13 miles from Paris. Fish Haven is situated upon the borders of Bear Lake where it or let me know her whereabouts, will be rewarded. washes a rather precipitous shore. This lake 37-17 is large and deep, the water soft and limped. After resting a little over an hour we returned passed over a splendid farming and grazing country; a great number of acres had been broke, and some wheat was up and looking and take away. well. Sunday, 22d:- A public out-door meeting was held opposite the dwelling of Elder C. C. Rich, at which President Young delivered some very interesting remarks on the labors before the settlers, encouraging them to build so as to protect themselves against the attacks of the Indians, to be careful about going in to the kanyons, to educate their children, to build good and comfortable homes, and to adopt laws for the punishment of the lawless. Eder Taylor also addressed the meeting.




