LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Tabernacle Services.—Elder C. W. Pearson preached yesterday afternoon.

Snow.—On the 17th inst. there was a foot of snow on the ground at Parkville, Morgan county.

Called.—On Saturday afternoon M. C. Hopkins, Esq., publisher of the Utah County Argus, Evanston, Wyo., called at our office.

From Bear Lake.—President William Budge, of Bear Lake county, and Elder J. U. Smith, are in the city, having arrived from the north this morning.

High Council.—The members of the High Council are requested to meet at the Council House, on Wednesday morning, the 22d inst., at 10 o'clock.

For England.—This morning Elder James L. Huntington, Counselor to the President of the Kanab Stake, left for England, on a mission to that country. Last evening a number of his friends met him at the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. Robert Dye, in the 20th Ward, spending a few pleasant hours together.

A Squabble.—On Washington square, on Saturday afternoon, the purchaser of a glass ticket accused the agent of the show of not giving him his proper change. The squabble was answered with a profane epithet and a slap in the face. The slapped party tried to return the blow and, falling in this, he drew his pistol and pointed it at the agent. This was done as a scare, as he had plenty of time to fire, but didn't. A policeman arrested both. Justice Fyler assessed a fine of \$10 against the ticket agent and \$5 against the other party.

The Washburn Party.—Yesterday Hon. E. B. Washburn and party left by the afternoon train, after a very agreeable sojourn in the city of a couple of days. The party visited the main points of interest on Saturday, and took a run out to Lake Point in the afternoon of the day. Mr. Washburn gave a reception at the Tower House, in the evening, and was serenaded by the Tenth Ward brass band.

Funeral Services.—The obsequies of Elder David G. Smith, of Big Cottonwood, were conducted according to previous announcement in the News, at his late residence, at 10 o'clock yesterday. The house being much too small for the large concourse of people that assembled to pay their respects to the departed, the services were conducted on the lawn adjacent.

The following old friends of the deceased delivered brief addresses. All of them testifying to the numerous noble traits of his character.

Bishop R. M. Miller, Elder R. F. Nelson, Bishop A. Gardner and Isaac M. Stewart, Elder Washington Lamm, Bishop E. D. Woolley and S. A. Westley, Elders Alex. Hill, Jacob Gibson, William Howard and Julian Moore.

After the people had viewed the remains, they were borne by his sons and other male relatives to a new private cemetery, from 1,200 to 1,500 people following on foot. The ground was consecrated at the same time, Elder R. F. Nelson officiating the dedication prayer.

The departed occupied the position of Bishop of Big Cottonwood Ward for a period of seventeen years, and his son David F. Nelson, now occupying that position.

Contemptible.—A very annoying and, in our view, unnecessary condition of things existed in the vicinity of the circus on Saturday evening. Several hundreds of people of all ages and both sexes were kept standing around upon the wet ground of the square, in the damp cool air, for about an hour. They were not allowed to enter the great circus tent, because the clubs who had leased the ground on which it was pitched had obtained an injunction from Judge Schaefer, preventing Mr. Forepaugh from opening until he had secured the license in the amount of \$1,000.

At the time the Council granted to the base ball and cricket clubs the privilege of leasing the ground, it was known the circus was coming, and an agreement was made between the Mayor and the lessees that the show should be allowed to use the ground, Mayor Little promising to send men to repair any damage that might accrue. This arrangement is not denied by the parties, yet, in the face of it, they applied for and obtained an injunction, for the purpose of extorting money from Mr. Forepaugh.

Further, the Marshal had fenced in the "diamond" of the base ball lots, to protect it. And as soon as the Mayor learned that legal proceedings had been entered, he visited the place, complained to them about the action they had taken, agreed there and then to place the ground in as good condition as it was found by the circus without any expense accruing to the lessees, and requested them to withdraw proceedings. They promised to do this, but notwithstanding this last arrangement they allowed the proceedings to go on, and Mr. Forepaugh had to deposit \$250 before he was allowed to open.

We believe the object of the parties who leased the ground to have been one of speculation, and the proceedings of Saturday afternoon fully justify that view.

We have reason to believe the proceedings referred to on the part of the lessees were inaugurated by a comparative few of them and that the majority of the club-men were opposed to them.

But One Night.—Miss Stevens and Mrs. Dalry purpose giving but one of their interesting entertainments at the Theatre in this city. On Wednesday night will be presented the only opportunity for the people of Salt Lake to hear performances that, wherever rendered, have obtained the very highest encomiums of the press. It is indeed seldom that artists receive such universally favorable criticisms as they have. Although the number of performers is small, consisting of the two ladies named, yet they are credited with the rare ability to keep up the keen interest and appreciation of their audiences from beginning to close. Lovers of music, persons for whom appreciably expressed emotions and sentiments have charms, as well as the fun-loving portion of the people will all be likely to be pleased and gratified with an entertainment such as is provided by the Stevens-Dalry combination.

Repeated rehearsals have perfected the players in their parts, costumes of the very best kind have been secured, and nothing has been left undone to insure an artistic success. We hope the weather will be so favorable that the public will be able to patronize the performance, as it is for a charitable object, and the ladies and gentlemen who will appear have been at considerable labor and expense.

Severe.—E. H. Anderson, wrote from Minnabie, Weber County, May 18th:

"It has been storming here for two days. Yesterday snow fell 7 inches. This morning we have four inches solid snow. The willows in the bottoms are bent to the earth, and the snow has bent the branches on the cottonwood trees, giving them a striking appearance. Omaha was all up under the storm, and looked promising. It is feared a severe frost will follow when it clears.

The Missionaries.—The company of missionaries that left this city on the 7th inst., enroute for Europe, arrived safely at New York on the 13th, after an interesting trip, that far on their journey. They received courteous treatment from the railroad officials along the route, and all were well.

Another Storm.—At noon to-day there were broad flashes of lightning and loud thunder-claps, succeeded by a heavy shower of rain this afternoon.
