steam-boilers, ice-cellars, etc. The cork is winnowed from impurities, ground in a mill, kneaded up with suitable cement, and pressed into bricks, then dried, first in the air, and afterwards by artificial heat. The bricks are not hard, and not liable to decomposition; they keep out moisture, heat, cold and sound
