GODMAN GETS THE AX.

Samuel I. Godman, deputy city license assessor, was discharged yesterday by City Auditor Rudolph Alf as a result of his arrest on the charges of assault with a deadly weapon, preferred by his former wife, Mrs. Ida M. Godman. In the complaint which Mrs. Godman made against her former husband, she declared that he struck her with a "black jack" while she was in the drug store last Tuesday night.

Frank Kimball, who has been a deputy under Godman, was appointed to succeed him. Numerous protests were filed with the city auditor requesting him to discharge Godman. The protests stated that a man who had made an unprovoked assault upon his divorced wife ought not to be allowed to hold any kind of an office.

San Godman was never heard of politically until he joined the Women's Social club. They were then living together and Mrs. Godman, who was formerly Mrs. Ida M. Savage, brought Godman to the front on account of his earnest work in the organization, and he was given a position at her request. A short time after he had been in office, they separated. Several of the "American" party officials declare that the only reason Godman was ever given a position was on account of his former wife's influence.

City Auditor Alf will send his communication to the city council Wednesday night asking the members to discharge his action in discharging Godman and appointing Kimball in his place. Some of Godman's friends are preparing to fight the action taken by Alf before his case comes to trial.

Godman has been an ardent supporter of Joseph Lippman for the majority nomination. Lippman, it is said, promised him the job of chief of police, if he was elected. Lippman, however, seems to be in about the same position as Godman now.
