#### REGULAR POLLING PLACES.

Sec. 3. A primary election held to nominate candidates to be voted for at the general election in November, 1908, shall be held at the regular poll-ing places in each precinct on the sec-ond Tuesday of September, 1908, and biennially thereafter, for the nomina-tion of all candidates to be voted for at the succeeding general election

the succeeding general election. Any primary other than the Septem-ber primary shall be held four weeks before the election for which candi-dates are to be nominated at such primary.

4. The name of no candidate all interested. The Torrens system of registering land titles may be placed in operation in Utah, if Hollingsworth's bill provid-ing for it passes this afternoon. It was made a special order for 3:30 after be-ing favorably reported by the judiciary committee.

Sec. 4.
