Judge Lewis has granted Lillian Kiefer a divorce from George W. Kiefer on the ground of failure to support.

E. S. Dickson has sold his four house terrace at Fifth South and Fourth East streets to Henry Blank for \$13,500.

The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company began this morning laying cable through the new underground conduit on east South Temple street.

Judge Lewis yesterday rendered judgment in favor of plaintiff for \$282.35 in the case of the Utah & Salt Lake Canal company against Gideon A. Gibbs.

Kerosene oil went up 1 cent a gallon yesterday afternoon. Local dealers say this will not necessarily affect the retail trade for the present, but may later on.

The city school teachers meet at 4:30 p. m. today at the West Side High school to hear the report of the committee to which was referred the nine months contract matter.

Benjamin R. Hite was examined as to his sanity yesterday afternoon by County Clerk James and Dr. May and Odell and was discharged, it being found that he is mentally sound.

Sheriff Bailey of Weber county brought down Jesse Rockefeller and Frank Cunningham to the state prison, for rape and larceny respectively. The latter has been in the reform school, but his conduct was so bad there, that the court concluded to send him to the prison.

The recent spell of fine weather just ended, lasted from Oct. 12 to the 25th. The sunshine was continuous, and the thermometer ranged from 40 to 72. In 1896 there was an approximation of this experience, but with this exception, the stretch of beautiful weather was a record breaker.

The sentiment of the association was in favor of a union of the Congregational, United Brethren and Methodist Protestant churches of the United States, and delegates to the national convention will vote that way.

M'CLOUD'S CAREER.

"Driftwood Jim" Has the Record of an All Round Bad Man.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., Oct. 29.—It develops that Jas. McCloud, alias "Driftwood Jim," in the county jail here awaiting trial on the charge of robbing the Buffalo postoffice, and who is also suspected of the murder of Ben Minnick, the Black Mountain sheepman who was assassinated last spring, is wanted at Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

McCloud was convicted of postoffice robbery in Kansas and was sentenced to ten years in the Leavenworth pen. He served nine months of the sentence and made a daring escape. From Kansas McCloud fled to northern Wyoming, where he re-entered upon a career of crime in Big Horn county. For a time McCloud posed as a "Mormon" settler, but his criminal work soon destroyed the mask under which he was sailing. It is alleged that McCloud was held for a long term at hard labor in the Wyoming penitentiary for his last crime.

CHANGES IN ROUTES.

Street Car Company Looking Into Better Service for Patrons.

The street railway management has placed six of the new cars on First South street to accommodate the university traffic, and the other two will run later on the Calder's Park line. The tracks on Ninth South street are being extended to Fourth East street, connecting with the Waterloo line. When that is finished either the Sixth street or South Temple street cars will run to Fifth South and thence to Fifth East and Liberty Park, and Short Line cars will run via the Salt Palace over the new line to Fourth East street, and to Waterloo, instead of via the present route.
