## CONFERENCES OF THE CHURCH.

The conference of Sappete Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints was held in Moroni on the 11th and 12th of Nov., 1893. Present of the authorities were Eiders F. M. Lynnan and J. H. Elder Lyman gave a very instructive discourse upon the duties of the presidency of the Stake, the High Council, the Bishops and the Teachers, showed the importance of the labors of each department of the Priesthood and the great necessity of the said labors being faithfully performed. He was followed by Elder Smith, who endorsed the remarks made in regard to our duties. He said there are quite a pumber of men who appear to be taken up with infidelity. He stated his belief in the ultimate conversion of the chis dren of the Latter-day Saints who may have been properly educated in the principles of the Gospel.

President Peterson gave notice that Elders Lyman and Smith would meet with the people of Wales at 7 p. m. for the purpose of dedicating their meeting nouse. Recess till 7 p. m.
7 p. m.—Eiter B. H. Ruberts dis-

coursed upon the labors of the Seventies; showed the necessity of improvement to enable them to acceptably perform the labors of the mission entrusted to them to carry the Gostel to nations of the earth. He gave an eloquent, descriptive outline of his Chicago experience.

Sunday, 10 a.m.—Elder L. J. Nut-tail reviewed the circumstances and conditions surrounding the people, the great educational advantages enjoyed by the young above their parents, and referred to the establishment of a theclogical class in Salt Lake City recently and the great interest taken therein.

Elder B. H. Roberts gave a very interesting discourse upon faith. Elder

J. B. Maiben expressed his appreciation of the opportunity to meet in coo ference and listen to the instructions given by the servants of God.

2 p.m.—Elder J. H. Smith gave some

of his experiences while on a foreign mission; spoke of the intolera ce manitested by those who profess to be teachers of the Gospel of Christ, and of the mighty strides of invention, the reducing the elements to man's use. He advise the brettren to call on the Lord and tell the Lord ust what they want and to be up and doing; if we do no more than we are told to do, that will be but little; if we do not do something we will be danned. He advised the young pec-ple to marry and beware of illicit kis-sing it they would avoid trouble; the Saints should cease card-playing-it is a gambling game.
