RICHFIELD THIRD WARD MEETINGHOUSE DEDICATED

(Special Correspondence.)
 RICHFIELD, Utah, June 14.—Richfield third ward meetinghouse was dedicated yesterday, June 12. Two meetings were held. During the morning service reports were made by the building committees, and in the afternoon the dedicatory prayer was offered by the president of the stake, William H. Secmiller, and appropriate addresses made by the stake presidency. The ground upon which the house stands was selected and purchased in the spring of 1904, and the work commenced in 1905. The building was finished ready for use in 1908, at a cost of nearly \$5,000, the greater part of which was contributed by the members of the ward. The building is 24 by 45 feet and is nicely furnished with seats and chairs and has a \$500 organ for the use of the choir. The basement is divided into departmental rooms. The house in appearance is plain but neat, and stands as a monument to the faith and industry of the members of the Richfield third ward. The ward choir, under the leadership of John Hood, rendered very creditable music for the dedicatory service.

DISTRICT COURT.

RICHFIELD, June 14.—The district court is still hearing the case of the State of Utah vs. W. A. Lyspey charged with shooting at Nick Sheffield, with intent to kill. The defense puts in a plea of self-defense and has introduced strong evidence to prove that Sheffield was the first to fire when the two men met at Burrville in April. The county surveyor, J. O. Anderson, was one of the chief witnesses yesterday, and by a map of the place of the alleged shooting, which he had prepared, he showed that it was not his best friend, but a bullet fired from the place where the prosecution alleges Lyspey was in ambush to have entered the horse upon which Sheffield was riding at the place alleged.

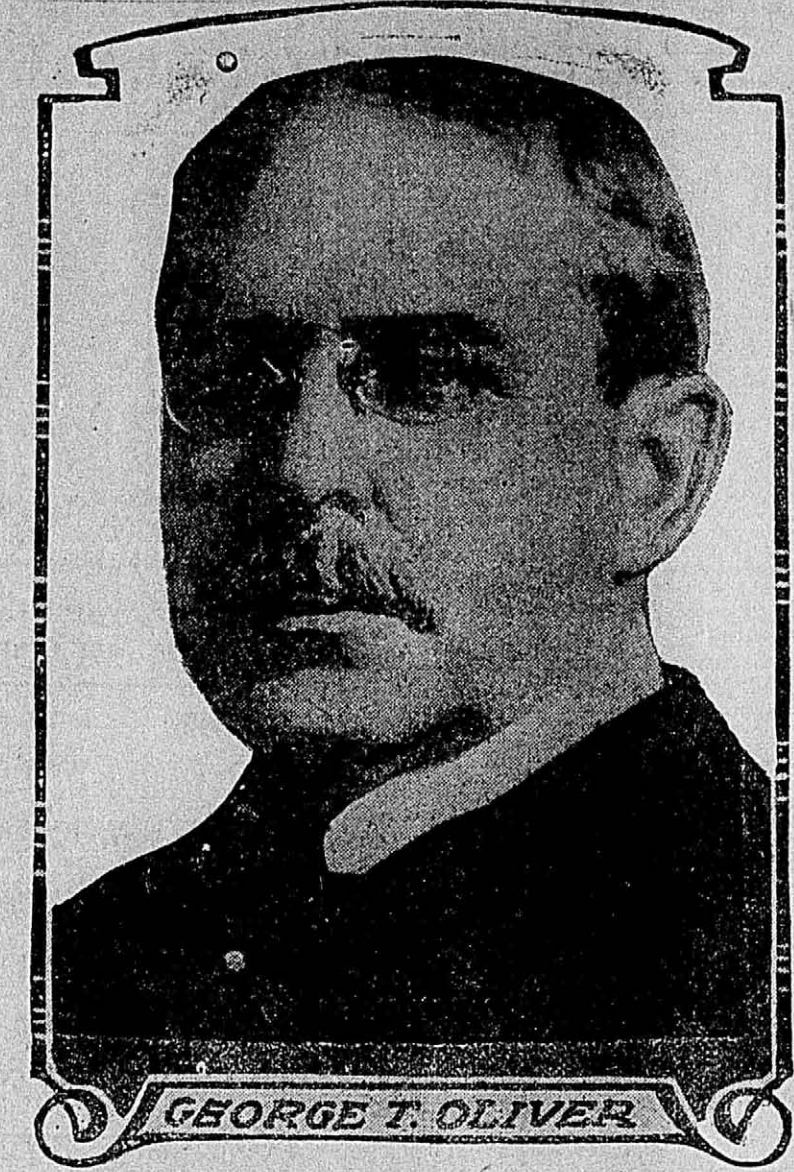
WILL CELEBRATE FOURTH.

The indictment of several officers and directors of the Silver Peak Mining company at Goldfield, Nev., and some of whom are prominent residents of Pennsylvania, has caused much comment in financial circles in this city. William Flinn, the millionaire political leader, is president of the company, and George T. Oliver, the newly elected United States senator from Pennsylvania, is vice president and the largest stockholder in the concern. The indictments grow out of bullion tax statements alleged to have been issued by the company. Messrs. Oliver and Flinn declare that they and their associates have spent \$2,000,000 in developing mines in Nevada and that they are entitled to consideration instead of being harassed.

WILLIE CLARK DROWNS IN CHALK CREEK

COALVILLE, SUMMIT Co., June 12.—Willie Clark, the 13-year-old son of William Clark, was drowned while trying to ford Chalk Creek today. The little fellow was riding in the Co-op wagon, driven by John Wilson, to East Coalville to deliver orders. To make a short cut of a few miles, and thinking that the water had receded low enough to cross an old ford, the two drove in. Mr. and Mrs. Eli Robinson, who were in the wagon, fearing the results, climbed out and walked across a footbridge. When the wagon reached the center of the stream it capsized, throwing the driver and boy under it. Wilson succeeded in getting out, but the boy was swept away with the swift current, and was seen no more. The team succeeded in getting out on the opposite side of the stream, about 100 yards from where it entered.

Word was brought into town and several men hurried to the creek, stretched wire nets in front of the bridge to catch the body and then scoured the banks.
