FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 21.—Garland offered

a resolution for the appointment of

a committee of seven Senators to

examine into the work now in progress

for the improvement of the

Mississippi River below Cairo; laid

over.

A bill passed, appropriating \$25,000

for the erection of a monument at

Washington's headquarters at

Nevers, N. Y.

The Senate went into executive

session. When the doors were re-

opened, the Senate proceeded to the

consideration of the army appropriation

bill.

The first important amendment

reported by the committee on military

affairs was the insertion of a

paragraph appropriating \$100,000 for

civilian clerks for the Adjutant General's

Department, and for head-

quarters of military divisions and

departments, adopted.

Edmunds called up the joint resolution

to provide for the termination of the

treaty of Washington in relation

to the fisheries.

Edmunds moved to take up the

Utah bill. Called upon the motion.

The Senate, by a vote of 22 yeas to

17 nays, decided to take up the bill.

Edmunds moved to strike out the 7th

section, which provides that it shall

not be lawful for any female to vote at

any election hereafter held in the

Territory of Utah for any public

purpose whatsoever.

Edmunds defended the provision.

The vote of the Mormon women was

controlled by men who desired to

keep up the political power of the

polygamous Mormon church. He

thought the importance of breaking

up the Mormon system would fully

justify the suspension of female

voting in Utah without any other

reason than that of the women

being controlled by men.

Edmunds said the question of suffrage

was a political question within the

control of the political

power, and what Hoar said about the

opinions of Mormon women was

entirely apart from this bill. If the

real opinions of these women could

find expression, he would wish to

have them vote, because the very

nature of every virtuous woman

recoiled against polygamy. It was

not for the purpose of disfranchising

any man or any woman on ac-

count of opinion, but to secure the

except perhaps Judge Black, would

agree that in point of law Congress

could regulate the suffrage in the

District of Columbia or in any Ter-

ritory; could confine it to the

holders of a hundred thousand dol-

lars; to paupers or to any other class.

Edmunds moved to amend the

section of the bill so as to make this

provision apply to persons instead of

females only, and only to persons

lawfully convicted of the crime of

polygamy. The conference

amendment was still pending

when the Senate adjourned.

Washington, 22.—Immediately

after reading the journal, the

Senate went into executive

session and confirmed the

nomination of Algeron S. Badger,

Collector of Customs for New Or-

leans.

The Senate proceeded to consider

the naval appropriation bill.

McPherson said the idea of the

present administration of the Navy

Department seemed to be to destroy

the existing navy so as to give an

opportunity for the construction of
