American Agriculturist, Whitewash can be put on with a good spray pump made for that purpose, or with a brush, On rough walls the material should be very thick, especially for the first coat. The interior of any building sprayed several times during the season will be much less liable to spread germs in the milk and other substances.

A great many housekeepers are at a loss to know what to do with their crop of grapes, if they have no direct market for the fruit. The grape makes an excellent jelly for cake, a good preserve, an agreeable spiced fruit and a fair cat-sup. There is also a considerable demand for pure grape juice for use as communion wine. The grape juice of manufacture is so often rendered impure and even poisonous by the use of acids to keep it from fermenting that many churches object to using it on the ground of health.

Have you a work shop on your farm? It should be made as sunny as possible, then your boys will be likely to spend more of their time there learning h to use varioups carpenter tools. Fai one who is inclined to carpentry a workshop of this kind is an attractive spot, but with the farmer it is a practical necesity.

Whenever the apples on a particular begin to appear smaller and with poor keeping qualities and lack of flav at each recurring season the grower maar know that the potash in the soil'is about exhausted and needs replenishing. This is much better applied in autumn that it may be thoroughly incorporated in the soli and be readily accessible, so as to be taken up utilized by the tree in the spring. Wood ashes will be a good substitute for comercial fertilizers, when the latter are not easily procurable. But the proper plant food can be much more intelligently applied by the inexperienced fruitgrower in the form of commercial

fertilizer prepared for this especial pur-pose. If stable manure or other nitro-genous material is to be applied, it should be done in the spring. This is the material to be used when a growth of wood is desired but case should be of wood is desired, but care should be taken that this is not secured at the expense of the fruit production,

Lessons in pruning is a frequent topic

it horticultural meetings, and always will be. Most people forget to prune. These forgetful people wake up once in 10 or 20 years to the fact that their orchards need pruning and then they prune most savagely, cutting off in one season as much as they should have ut off in 10 seasons. The great secret of pruning is to prune a little every year, then there will be no large limbs to remove which, in most cases, leave ugly wounds that never entirely heal over, When our gruitgrowers learn to grow low headed trees in their orchards, with the branches resting almost upon the ground, there will not be so much need of pruning. Most farmers pruna chards trees high enough so that their chard trees high enough so that their chard trees high enough so that their horses can work beneath them.

Shall I keep bees on the farm? Yes, particularly if you are a fruitgrower. Bees are helpful to large and small fruits since they carry pollen from one blossom to another which helps to pro. duce crops of fruit. Bees are an inter sting study. They are one of God's narvelous creations. Honey is health-
