

A GLANCE AT THE SOUTH.

In the Region of the Shenandoah Valley.

After a short drive, I have passed through the picturesque Piedmont country to the Shenandoah valley recently, I thought a few lines might be interesting to your readers. For a distance of fifty miles, from Gordonsville to the Blue Ridge, the Piedmont country is most delightful. It consists of fertile valleys, about several miles in width, and narrowing till the hills seem almost ready to touch each other. It is one of the most interesting and picturesque portions of the South.

Charlottesville, the county seat of Albemarle county, is a pretty place situated upon rising ground at the base of the southwest mountain, containing several thousand inhabitants. There are several manufactures in active operation, such as woolen, fertilizing and flouring mills, sugar and tobacco manufactures, a manufacture of agricultural implements, and various other minor branches of industry, besides banks, stores, hotels and other places fitted to serve a city.

About a mile east of the R. R. depot is the University of Virginia, which is attended by 500 students, and is a large, handsome building, with magnificent grounds. It contains a library of 100,000 volumes—the largest in the South.

Monticello, the home of Jefferson, is a pretty village from the C. & O. railroad. It is a primitive but old Virginia mansion. It faces the west and is surrounded by a thick growth of trees. It was here the author of the Declaration of Independence sought refuge from the wrath of the British army; it was here that the principles of Thomas Jefferson were fostered and nurtured. The man is dead, but the principles of his pen and the trophies of his statesmanship will live on as long as the world endures and republics flourish. Near the gateway, at the entrance of the grounds, is a modest little and on an adjacent hillside is the monument to the memory of the late Mr. Jefferson.

Monticello was confiscated during the war by the Federal authorities and was subsequently released, according to Jefferson's will a large portion of the property was to revert to the descendants of Virginia for educational purposes.

About six miles from Charlottesville we drove through the grounds and inspected the Miller Manual Labor school, an extensive institution for the education of the children of the country. The buildings are of brick and stone, and present an imposing appearance. Here are educated the boys and girls until they become eighteen years of age, free of charge. The students are furnished with food and clothing, and their education is their home until they become the disappointed men when they are qualified to battle in life for themselves. They spend from eight weeks to twelve months residing in the school, and the afternoon is spent in the work shops learning mechanical arts. From 7 o'clock to 8:30 p. m. they are in the dining room preparing their lessons for the next day, in the evening they have an hour of play and then retire to their rooms. Between 8 and 9 p. m. we ran through a tunnel, a mile long, right under the Blue Ridge range and soon find ourselves at a new town—Harrisonburg. This city is less than two years old. It is one of the largest cities in the South, and is one of the most beautiful cities in the South. It is situated in the Shenandoah valley, making the beautiful valley of the Shenandoah. This valley is considered the finest country in the South. It was from this section that the Confederate army drew much of their strength, and though the people were not overrun with battle, yet they felt the heavy drain made upon them by their own army.

The site of Waynesboro is an undulating plateau at the height of 1400 feet above sea level. South river, a branch of the Shenandoah, flows by the town and affords the power for any one man may see it to make of it. Within its bounds are law and other kinds of fish, and the mountain forests adjacent afford sport to the sportsman.

The place has two large factories, a saw, door and blind factory, hydraulic engine works, a flouring mill with a capacity of 125 barrels a day, and an agricultural woodworking establishment.

Waynesboro has two schools of high rank. Fashburn's military school has been young men in attendance (the military department is used for discipline and exercise), and the Valley Seminary with the young ladies in attendance. There are also graded schools for white and colored children. The streets are narrow and sidewalks paved with rubble, and altogether it is a quaint little town of the old days, when it was a little town at the present, and with the advantages it possesses ought to make a city in the near future.
