

Judge Phillips Decides that Insurance Companies May Enforce It.

ance Companies May Enforce It. Kansas City, Mo, Nov. 3.—In a decision in the United States court here today surance companies may enforce the anti-surance of the Insured. The decision was in the case of James Whitfield, a well known newspaper sport-ing editor, who killed himself. Whitfield insured for \$5,000, receiving a policy that contained a clause specifying that \$500 only should be recovered in case of sui-cide. Although the statutes of Missouri declare that insurance companies may not make suicide a defense in refusing to pay a policy. Judge Phillips held that "as the pleading of the contract in question, vol-untarily entered into by the parties, goes merely to the question of the amount of the recovery, and not to defeat a recov-ery, my conclusion is that the plaintiff sonly entitled to recover the sum of \$500." and all Principal Eastern Points

Ills Brother-in-Law, J. T. Donahue, Wants Him to Account for Ajax Stock-J. T. Donohue has filed sult in the district court against Samuel McIn-tyre, his brother-in-law, to compel an tyre, his brother-in-law, to compel an accounting for 20,000 shares of Ajax stock which it is alleged defendant fraudulently secured from plaintiff. It is alleged that plaintiff was the owner of the stock and that, on May 6, 1895, McIntyre borrowed the stock

6. 1835, MCHAYPE Dorrowed the stock from him for the purpose of voting it at a directors' meeting in order to con-trol the affairs of the Ajax company. That was the last plaintiff ever saw of his stock and he alleges that defendant sold 10,000 shares of it in March, 1896, for \$10,500.

In November of that year plaintiff demanded the return of his 20,000 shares, whereapon, it is alleged, McIn-tyre represented that he still had the stock and he offered Donohue \$4,220 for it. The offer was accepted, after which McIntyre sold the remaining \$10,000 shares for \$8,900. Plaintiff asks that the sale of the stock by him to defend-ant be declared null and yold for the the sale of the stock by him to defend-ant be declared null and void for the reason that it was made upon the fraudulent representations of defend-ant, and also that an accounting be had in relation to the stock.
