David Morgan Demands \$25,000 for the Death of James Morgan.

TWO WEEKS TO COMPLETE.

Summer Amusements—Power of Dog Catcher in Question—City Campaign Against Fifth.

Ogden, May 7.—An action has been filed in the district court by W. L. Maginnis and R. S. Farnsworth as attorneys for David Morgan against the Southern Pacific company, asking for damages in the sum of \$25,000 alleged to be due for the death of James Morgan who was killed in Ogden April 4, 1907, while working in the car shops in this city.

SOLD LIQUOR TO MINORS.

A complaint was drawn up yesterday afternoon by County Attorney Harris and sworn to by Probation Officer Jacobs, charging Mangus Ingebreten and Hugh McMartin with selling liquor to minors. The complaint alleges that the two defendants are proprietors of the Emerald saloon and that they sold a case of beer to minors on April 18. The authorities believe that they have sufficient evidence on hand to secure a conviction and a warrant will be sworn out today and the arrest of the defendants together with the bartender of the saloon will probably follow.

COTTLE ESTATE.

Ogden, May 7.—According to Charles W. Cottle his father Thomas E. Cottle, deceased, left no will as alleged by his wife Mary Cottle, in a petition filed several days ago, asking that the will in question be admitted to probate. On Wednesday Cottle filed in the district court a statement denying that a valid will had been made by his father. He says the instrument was not signed by his father but by John May who wrongfully assumed to act for his deceased father. Cottle asks the court to grant him letters of administration on the estate in the absence of a legal will. The estate consists of real property valued at \$3,000 and personal property, \$1,000.

COMPLETED IN TWO WEEKS.

Salt Lake and Ogden Road Will be Open to Traffic.

Ogden, May 7.—Simon Bamberg, president of the Salt Lake & Ogden railway, was in the city yesterday, and in the afternoon drove out to the work on the line, where he was being rushed both night and day for the completion of the line into this city by Decoration day.

Mr. Bamberg states that if his entrance is not further obstructed by the Ogden citizens he will have trains operating between Ogden and Salt Lake within a couple of weeks. He states that if he is permitted to use steam engines temporarily that he will bring more than 200,000 visitors into the city during the summer months.
