BIG IRRIGATION PROJECT.

Planning to Redeem Nearly 50,000 Acres by Impounding Beaver River. Special Correspondence.

Milford, Beaver Co., May 4 .- The plans for the great irrigation project along the Beaver river in this county are steadily reaching a point where the work of construction will begin. Hon. Joseph Kimball and State Engineer Caleb Tanner visited the site during the warfor state. during the past few days and the de-tails of the project were explained to the state official. Mr. Kimball is president and general manager of the company, and states that he and business associates have secured from the government a grant of 48,226.74 acres, and have also obtained other property. It is the intention of the company to construct a large dam in the Beaver river near Millerville, and take out a large quantity of water for these tracts. As soon as the canals are completed, the tract granted by the government under the Carey act will be open to settlement, and those who acquire homestead rights there. acquire homestead rights thereon will able to purchase a water right with their land.
