

lent quality, Small fruits do well and the more hardy grapes are almost a sure crop. Bishop L. C. Burnham was the pioneer here. J. B. Ashcroft is the present Bishop, and under his energetic eadership the place is fast developing. More industrious settlers can find homes here, where climate and condi-tions invite. Fuel is cheap, coal can be had at the mines in the district at 75 cents to \$1 a ton, and it is of a very good quality. Great coal ledges crop out on the river bank opposite the town. There is a flouring mill at this place run by the energetic agent of the "News," Mr. W. G. Black, which turns out a good quality of flour. From Mancos, Colo., to this place is a dis-tance of sixty miles. The road is down the La Plata. On this stream new farms and being taken up in Colorado, while the developed properties in New Mexico are without sufficient water to irrigate. Farmers were at work clean-ing out ditches and canals, yet the La lata river was dry, a condition that never existed at this season of the year before, and the snow is very light in the mountains. The district of Jack-son, where a number of Saints were located, is dry and deserted, yet the people went to great expense to construct canals and reservoirs and now there is no water for either. The outlook along the La Plata is not flattering unless more moisture comes. But at Fruitland here the people have plenty of water as they draw their supply from the San Juan river.

Many old-timers are here who have been well known in Utah. Ira Hatch, the old-time Indian missionary, is here. alive and active as ever, and still full of faith. Wm. J. Johnston, one of the four who shoveled out the first gold in Sutter's mill race in California, is here, with faculties clear and memory active, while Mr. Pipin, 94 years of age, R. Young, though he has lost one of his arms, is still a rustler, and accomplishes as much as some with two arms.


