POISONING DOGS!

Editor Reasing News.—Seeing the above article in your last evening's issue, wherein it states that "several valuable dogs that were registered have been recently killed" by poisoning. I thought it might be proper for me, as Recorder, to say a word in relation to that subject. As you are aware, I published notices in the City papers, during the month of March last, requesting all persons owning dogs to call upon me and have them registered, as the term of their annual registration had expired. At the same time the "Ordhiance in relation to Dogs" was published. I certainly expected a visit from Messrs, Newfoundiand, Buil, Greyhound, shepherd, Setter, Pointer, Terrier, Spaniel and Poodle Dogs and Doggesses, in all their varied size and color, with new fit-out of collars, tags, names and numbers duly registered by their owners—but to my surprise, to-day, I must confess, there stands upon my record but eleven of that illustrious race worthy of a name and place, There are many dogs having collars place. There are many dogs having collars that are not registered. I therefore doubt whether a legally registered dog has suffered the death penalty. Those to whom is entrusted the business of killing dogs, I feel authorized to say, have taken the greatest care to insure the lives of the privileged few, and that such parties have not left around poisoned food; but persons who have committed such overtacts as are received to are liable to be dealt with. As the case now stands, if owners of dogs do not value them sufficiently to have them registered, and the provisions of the Ordinance of our City are duly executed, I fear the canine race, valuable or otherwise, will soon become nearly extinct
