# MEET TO DISCUSS JUVENILE COURT

Annual Convention of Association Is Held in Salt Lake Today.

## TO REVISE THE PRESENT LAW

Committee Is Appointed to Bring Up The Matter Before the Next Legislature.

The third annual conference of the Juvenile Court association of Utah is in progress today, the sessions being held in the rooms of the board of education in the city and county building. The meetings are not so largely attended as had been anticipated, owing to the fact that the convention had been called for so late a date in the period known as conference week. Many persons from various parts of the state who are interested in juvenile court work left for home before the convention was called.

Those present, however, entered enthusiastically into their work and the papers were read and received with great interest. One feature of this morning's session was the appointment of a committee to suggest changes in the juvenile court law for the next legislature.

Another feature was the presentation of suggestions on the working of the law and the court by Judge E. G. Gowans of this city.

Judge Gowans held that it must be manifest to all who have followed the subject that the juvenile court has a place in the judiciary of this state. Some defects exist in the laws bearing upon this judicial phase and some difficulty is experienced in meeting the requirements of the new law.

While the law gives the juvenile court jurisdiction in case of adults contributing to the delinquency of minors, it provides no procedure for handling such cases, except in the justice's court.

Something should be done, he said, to amend the paragraph on jurisdiction, relating to persons accused of contributing to delinquency. If the juvenile court were given procedure similar to justice's courts, he thought, the difficulty would be overcome. The legislature should be asked to remedy the defect. Many of the difficulties coming before the juvenile court are traced to contributory delinquency of adults. It would be better to have appeals go from the juvenile court to the district court, rather than to the supreme court.

**DEFECTS IN THE LAW.** Another defect in the law, in the opinion of Judge Gowans, is the provision giving to the legislature rather than to the juvenile commission the power of fixing salaries of juvenile court officials. The salaries are in most instances inadequate, and discretion in this direction should be given to the legislature.

Methods of dealing with boys of different ages was next considered. Judge Gowans thought that in some cases of boys 17 or 18 years of age, to impose a fine would have a salutary effect.

**GENERAL DISCUSSION.** The subjects dealt upon by Judge Gowans were discussed by Judge Pedersen, of Logan, Mr. Allen, of Hyrum, President Christensen, Secretary Preston D. Richards and Guardello Brown. Mr. Pedersen was the opinion that each county should be required to meet part of the expenses incurred in juvenile court work within its jurisdiction, rather than that the state should pay it all.

A paper prepared by George Christensen, of Mount Pleasant, on "Probation Work," was read by Mrs. A. L. Young, who presided. The paper was participated in by Mrs. Young, George M. Mumford, D. E. Gowans and Mrs. McMahon.

The convention passed a resolution calling for the naming of a committee of five to work for changes in juvenile court laws, when the next legislature meets.

This afternoon, papers were read by Mrs. Hugh Park, on the "Canyon Crest Ranch," and Governor John C. Cutler on "The Detention Home," followed by an election of officers for the ensuing year.
