Isadore Morris, one of the best known Jewish chilzens of Utah and Idaho, died yesterday afternoon, at his home, 449 east Second South street, from paralysis super-induced by diabetes. Mr. Morris was g years old, and came to this territory with the California volunieers under Gen. Con-nor in 1862, and took an active part in the establishment of Fort Douglas. He was subsequently offered a lieutenant's com-mission in the regular army, and had he ac-cepted it, would have been at the time of his death, a full colonel of regulars and perhaps a brigadler general. But he de-clined the offer, and went into active busi-ness, first in Utah, and afterwards in Idaho, but retired a few years ago, and had since resided in this city. The de-ceased was severely injured nine years ago in a runaway accident in Chihuahua, and his injuries may have had something to do with his final illness. He was a prominent Mason, and the funeral will be conducted under the auspices of that or-der. Mr. Morris leaves a wife, three daughters and two sore, one of the daughters is the wife of Lion.
