ANOTHER ANTI-EDUCATION MOVEMENT.

THE attempt of certain "Liberals" o the Seventh Ward to-defeat the movement for the building of a schoolhou in that District having accomplished nothing before the Utah Commission, they have now carried the conflict into the Third District Court, and have secured the services of the U.S. District Attorney and his assistant to condu their case. Fearful and wonderful are the vagaries of the Scotch marriage law. From time out of mind it has been considered legal for people to marry merely by making a declaration in the pressure of witnesses. The City Council should not be inluenced by such expressions of public opinion as are ever directed against any new idea idea and are opposed to local enterprise. Neither should it be induced to give away anything of real value to the city without some equivalent. They are great civilizers, in the best sense of the term. They have been established and operated with great profits, in many instances, to the prosctore and manipulators. That is all right if rogery does not prevail. But while railroad builders and speculators make lots of money, the great public receive immense benefits and the general result is beneficial. We should not stand in the way of needed improvements. Neither should we study the interests of railroad companies to the neglect of our own. Their assumption of regard for the public welfare, is of course to be taken for what it is worth. They work and speculate for profit to themselves, there is no mistake about that. But if benefit will arise to the public from their projects, that should be considered without special reference to what they will make, unless the conessions they ask involve a public sac-
