RAILROAD SCHEDULES.

Grand and His Mexican Project.

New York, 24.—Members of the
committee on the organization of a
railroad system in Mexico, who were
appointed at a meeting held at De-
lmonico's on November 11th last, met
yesterday, pursuant to order of the
chairman, Grant, at which the fol-
lowing gentlemen were present: Gen.
Grant, chairman; Senator Maria
Romero, (Thomas) Nicholson, repre-
sented the Mexican Central Rail-
road Company; Edward D. Adams,
of the Mexican Central and Sonora
Railroad Company; Huntington, of
the Southern Pacific Railroad Com-
pany; Jay Gould, of the Missouri
Pacific Railroad Company; Henry
G. Marquand, of the Iron Mountain
Railroad Company; Kennedy, of
the Texas and Pacific Railroad Com-
pany; J. Henry Work; Frank S.
Bond, of the Texas Pacific; J. B.
Torbson, of the Missouri, Kansas &
Texas; George Palmer; Gen. W.
Woerthoff, representing the Mexi-
can Construction Company and
Thomas Jefferson Coolidge, of Bos-
ton, president of the Atlantic, To-
peka & Santa Fe Railroad Company,
who were also invited, were unable
to attend. Adams read the report
of the majority of the sub-commit-
tee appointed at the previous meet-
ing in this city on the 20th of Novem-
ber last, to the effect that the sub-
committee found it impossible to
harmonize all the interests. Adams
added, by way of explanation, that
the Mexican Central Railroad Com-
pany and the Sonora Railroad Com-
pany were in favor of a substantial
union among all the railroads in
Mexico, but that the parties interested in
the Mexican Construction Com-
pany were not disposed to agree to any
plan looking to that end. Gould
declined to state what he desired
to be taken as the minority report,
and which presents the following
basis for an agreement and plan of
joint action:

First: That all the parties who
already hold charters from Mexico,
together with the signers of the re-
port, shall agree jointly to construct
any road, or roads, required by the
people of Mexico, on their own
own terms, each party having
equal rights in all the roads built
under this agreement. In case of this
agreement, work is to be done on
the three lines of railroad now
building under existing Mexican
charters, in accordance with the
terms of those charters, until the
completion of the same. The lines
not yet built have been and shall be
obtained from the Mexican govern-
ment, with a view to make them all
conform to such other terms as the
new combination may ask and ob-
tain from Mexico. All vested inter-
ests and franchises already made
to be equally preserved and main-
tained. Second: That the present char-
ter interests shall continue to con-
struct their several respective roads,
and that each of the signers of the
report shall retain the right to build
and may build such lines of roads as
may be required for their respective in-
terests, and that the obligations of
roads from the same points as those
also constructing on the frontier of
Mexico, and also to diverge as far
from these lines throughout the sev-
eral parts of the country, the situa-
tion of the center of population and
the course of commerce, and climatic
considerations will admit.

Third: Falling in both of the
above provisions, the signers are dis-
posed to entertain and well enter-
tain a proposition, subjecting their
respective charters and franchises in
regard to these Mexican railroads to
their chairman, Gen. Ulysses S.
Grant, his decision to be rendered
in writing before the first day of
February next, and not later,
which decision will be accepted by
both parties, and the obligations
thereon executed to carry it out.

Other propositions were submitted
with a view to some general agree-
ment, and after a protracted discus-
sion of these, the committee adopted
a strong feeling in favor of commu-
nity of action made itself apparent,
the meeting adjourned subject to a
call at any time by its chairman.

Northern Pacific Project.

Fred. Billings, president of the
Northern Pacific, told
Times interviewer yesterday, that
General Anderson, engineer-in-chief
just returned from the Yellowstone
Valley, has already contracted for
timber for 200 miles on that
division, and his instructions are to
accomplish in the coming year the
suggested extension of the line
construction up to the Yellowstone
Valley, with the view of closing
up the central gap of 820 miles,
and having the road running
through it.

The gap is from Glendive, where
the Missouri division ends on the
Yellowstone to the eastern end of
the Fend Doreille division, which
extends 20 miles from Alamyah,
on the Columbia River, west of Lake
Doreille. The Fend Doreille divi-
sion will be completed in the
early spring. It is nearly all graded,
the materials are provided and on
the spot, and the track is now being
laid. As soon as it is completed,
the work will be continued without
any interruption, and with vigor-
ous progress up the Yellowstone,
going west and from Lake Pend
eastward, and the completion of the
central gap in 1883. In addition to this
activity in the heart of the continent,
work is to be commenced this
winter on the extension of the
work on the central gap, and on the
Wisconsin division, the company
proposes during the coming year to
begin the connection on the western
end of the Fend Doreille division with
the water.

SOUTH AMERICAN WAR.
