-- Miss Lizzie St. Clair Dill, one of the most accomplished ladies in Indiana, will be a candi ate before the next Legislature for State Librarian.


-- It is estimated that by the great typhoon in China, in August last, 14,000 lives were lost in Canton and 4,000 in Wampoa.






