Here is power granted to the Legislative Assembly, alone, without any action or concurrence or approval of the Governor, to make such laws "as it shall deem proper" for the filling of the offices made vacant by the Edmunds law. Such laws must be conformable to the Organic Act and the laws of the United States. Anything forbidden in those laws cannot be legalized by the Assembly, of course. But the power to pass them is vested in the Assembly of itself. It is not the Governor and the Legislative Assembly together that are to enact them. For this special purpose the Edmunds Act vests the right in that body of itself to pass such laws as the Legislature may deem proper. The Governor is left out entirely.
