tains say they would not use the canal

for good and sound nautical reasons,

even were they allowed to go through

it free.

OTAWA, 31.—In the Senate, the Post-

master-General stated that the claims of

Canada for Fenian raid expenses, had

been submitted to the joint high com-

mission at Washington, and if they

were not entertained, the government

would press them on the attention of

the imperial government.

In the House of Commons, after the

rejection of several amendments, the

government plan for the admission of

British Columbia into the Dominion,

and for the construction of a Pacific

railroad, was adopted by a vote of 91

to 70.
