### Nevada Lawyer and Mining Man Leases Some Manganese Mines.

F. R. McNamee has taken a long term lease on the manganese mines about 14 miles cast of Los Vegas, says the De Lamar Lode, and will do considerable development work on the property during the next few months, in fact the work has already commenced, on the Iron King claim. ## SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

#### California Litigation Which Involved Property Worth \$5,000,000.

An Associated Press dispatch from

Stockton, California, says: A big mining suit, involving the Roy-al mine at Hodson, estimated to be worth nearly \$5,000,000, has been com-promised, the plaintiff, J. H. Brother-ton, formerly of London but now of Denver, securing everything he asked for. The facts in the case, as stated in the complaint, are as follows:

J. H. Brotherton, the plaintiff, and John C. Kemp Van Ee, the latter being the present superintendent of the Royal mine, were promoters in London from 1896 to 1898. During that time they acquired considerable mining property, including the Royal mine, located at Hodson, in Calaveras coun-ty. Brotherton was taken into the proposition, owning a half-interest. Brotherton did not think he was being treated fairly, so he brought suit for an accounting and for his share of the profits of the mine. The case was to have come up for trial in the Superior court of Calaveras county at San An-are, but a compromise was effected and the suit has been dismissed by stipula-



**Rescript Regarding Finns.** 

St. Petersburg, Jan. 8,-An Imperia rescript to the governor-general of Fin-land directs the governor to dismiss all Finas employed in the state or mu-nicipal government service who have not fulfilled their military service in the Finnish rifle battalion during 1903, and not to issue foreign passports to them for five years. When granting loans or assistance from state funds to communes or individuals, or dealing with petitions for the remission of fines, the governor is ordered to take into consideration the extent of the op-position to levying recruits offered by the applicants. Students of the higher schools who have not performed milischools who have not performed for tary service are to be expelled for periods not exceeding a year. governor is also empowered to release Finns who have joined the colors and to replace them by evaders of military service, and he is directed to issue a proclamation announcing that all Finns not presenting themselves for service in 1904 will be drafted into regiments outside of Finland.
