7-Philip Danforth Armour, founder of the great Armour Packing house, died in Chicago, aged 69. He was worth between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000.

Joseph Robinson Walker, one of the most prominent merchants and mining men of Utah, died in Salt Lake, aged 65.

8-F. H. Halverson, a pioneer of Pioneer, died at his home in Marietta, aged 71 years.

8-Shure Olson, an old musician of Salt Lake died here, aged 83 years.

9-William L. Sperry of Nephi, a Pioneer to Utah, died at the age of 77 years.

10-C. K. Bannister, a well-known Utah civil engineer, died at Ogden; aged 57 years.

11-Lorenzo Dickert, the Salt Lake architect and draughtsman died of heart failure.

12-Cornelius Osborne, a veteran resident of Weber county, died in Ogden; aged 88 years.

James Sewall, an octogenarian resident of Salt Lake, died of old age.

13-William Van Dyke, a well-known resident of Salt Lake and Ogden, died, aged 71, at his home in this city.

21-Prof. Elisha Gray of Chicago, who was associated with Prof. A. Graham Bell in perfecting the Bell telephone, died suddenly at Newtonville.

22-Queen Victoria of England died at Osborne House after a short illness. She was born in 1819 and became queen in June 1837.

23-Mrs. John D. Ford, manager of Ford's hotel, died after two weeks' illness.

26-David Moore, Bishop of Mound Fort, died in Ogden, aged 82 years.

28-Verd, the great composer of "The Trovatore" and other operas, died in Milan.

30-Mrs. Anna Sears Young, wife of Capt. J. Wash Young, died of diphtheria.

Mrs. Rixey Elliott Keller, a Utah Pioneer, died in this city at the age of 91 years.

February

8-Mrs. Merrill Hardy, a Pioneer of Utah died in Brigham City.

11-Representative Albert D. Shaw of Watertown, New York, and a former commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., died in Washington, aged 60 years.

William Buttle, a resident of Utah since 1853, died in this city at age 74 years.

12-Ex-King Milan of Servia died in Vienna of pneumonia, aged 47 years.

Judge Jacob B. Blair, surveyor-general of Utah, died suddenly at the Alta club.

14-Oscar B. Adams, a pioneer of Utah and a member of the "Jormon" Battalion, died in Leeds, Washington county, Utah.

15-Dr. Karl G. Maeser, the "Father of Church Education in Utah," died in this city. He came to Utah from Meissen, Germany, in 1860, and was 73 years old in January.

16-Col. Peter S. Michie, professor of natural philosophy at the National Military Academy, died at West Point, New York.

Thomas Fowler, deputy marshal of Utah county, died at Lehi.

21-Mrs. Julia Craig, wife of J. L. Craig, travelling auditor of the Oregon Short Line railroad, died at the Holy Cross hospital.

22-One hundred lives were lost by the sinking of the steamer Rio Janeiro off Golden Gate.

Mrs. Samantha Smith, mother of Mrs. Gill Peyton, died in Salt Lake.

25-Arza Erastus Hinkley, a "Mormon" Battalion veteran, died at Rexburg, Idaho.

28-William M. Everts, the noted American lawyer, died in New York, aged 83 years.

9-William Buckley, who drove the first stage between Kansas City and Salt Lake, died in San Jose, California, aged 73 years.

11-Gilbert Wilkes, son of Major Wilkes of Salt Lake, died in Denver, aged 82 years.

Charles F. Fuchs, of Paris, Idaho, died in Germany while on a mission.

12-Benjamin Harrison, ex-President of the United States, died at Indianapolis.

President William F. Rigby, counselor to President Ricks of the Promontory, Idaho Stake, died in Logan of Bright's disease.

15-David McFarland son of Representative McFarland of the Utah legislature died at Birch Creek, Idaho.

Hans P. Knudsen, manager of the novelty works in this city shot and killed himself.

18-George L. Clift, the professor of dancing, shot and killed himself while suffering from illness.

19-County Commissioner Neph Tarr, a Utah pioneer, died at Logan.

20-Vincent Scappatura, a cultured Italian musician, who came to Utah in 1877-78, died as the result of an operation.

William H. Folsom, a pioneer architect and builder of Utah, died, aged 86 years.

21-Philip Botha, son of the great Boer commander, was killed on the Dorenborg in King.

Damon B. Kling, a civil war veteran and a resident of Bountiful, died from heart failure.

Roy Briggs, the 17-year-old son of Ephraim Briggs, met with a terrible accident near Corinne, which resulted in death.

23-Charles F. Decker, a son-in-law to President Brigham Young and an early settler in Utah, died at Vernal, aged 77 years.

Mrs. Preston S. Brooks, widow of the man who named Charles Sumner in the

United States Senate, died in Columbia, South Dakota.

26-W. H. H. Spafford, a well known real estate dealer, died in this city.

27-B. F. Knowlton, a prominent citizen of Farmington, died suddenly, aged 63 years.

E. H. Buchanan, a newspaper man of Green River, Wyoming, was accidentally killed in the Martha Washington mine.

Hon. Isaac D. Haines, a prominent Utah man, died in Ogden of pneumonia.

4-Wm. E. Johnson, the Denver-Cripple Creek millionaire, died in St. Paul, Minn.

10-Sylvanus Collett, the widely known frontiersman, died in this city at the age of 65 years.

11-William Galtsoffer, former Salt Lake mining man, died in Butte.

11-Hon. Robert C. Chambers, part owner of the Ontario mining company at Park City, died in San Francisco.

12-President George Q. Cannon died at Monterey, California, after a protracted illness.

Chairman Walker of the Santa Fe railroad died in New York.

16-General Gros, inventor of the Gros rifle, died at Auxerre, France.

Major William Monaghan died in the Philippines of heart disease.

William Calder, the well-known Pioneer, died suddenly in this city.

2-Joseph Linford, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Linford, died at his home in North Ogden.


William Groat, the pioneer peddler of Utah, died at Lake Shore, near Provo.
