Our Lord's Prayer was derived from the Jewish Liturgy. Dr. Comber says: "When the disciples came and asked our Lord for such a form of prayer as the doctors among them were wont to give to their scholars, he prescribed this set form, which for words and phrases he took out of the Jewish forms with little variation, to show how far he was from all affectation of novelty in devotion."

Dr. Whitby observes "that this prayer is wholly taken out of Jewish Liturgies, with the single additional petition, 'as we forgive them that trespass against us.'"

Also Stephens, in his "Guide," says: "The Jews had eighteen prayers in their daily service, which they bridged to a brief form that contained the substance of them all, with which the disciples were well acquainted. Besides, it was customary with the great teachers to give their followers some prayers as a badge of their discipleship, as we are informed John the Baptist had given to his disciples. Christ's disciples, in the second year of His ministry, requested Him to comply with the usual custom among Rabbis, and to teach them to pray with His spirit. He then appointed the same prayer for a form to be far gone, dies of venous apoplexy."
