For Building Fence at the Utab Ex resition Grounds.

EALED PROPOSALS ADDRESSED TO the undersigned will be received up to o a.m. of Saturday, September 1st, 1988, for building 100 rods, more or less, of close board fence around a portion of the Utah Exposition Grounds, Salt Lake City.
