At Lake Town, Rich County, Utah, June 18, 1879, of lung fever and convulsions, MARY ELLINOR only daughter of Franklin and Elizabeth Merrill. Aged 9 months and 21 days.

At Ashley's Fork, Friday, June 16th, 1879, from a stroke of lightning, ROBERT HY RAM, son of Samuel C. and Henrietta Maria Snyder.

Deceased was born March 10th, 1853, in Salt Lake Valley, was a man of good moral character and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and two children to mourn his loss.

OBITUARY.

Died at Wellville, Cache County, June 2nd, 1879, MOTHER LE SHAN, after an illness of 11 weeks, aged 75 years, 6 months, and 10 days.

Mother Jane Allan Leishman was the daughter of James Allan and Ann McGregor, was born at Quinrellton, near Johnstone, Kent, England, Dec. 11th, 1803. She was raised in the Presbyterian faith, but emigrated with her husband and family to Utah in 1852, locating at Little Cottonwood; remained there until the fall of 1854, when she moved to Cedar Fort, Utah County, at which place she lived until the spring of 1860, when she moved with her husband and family to Wellville, Cache County, at which place she had lived until her demise. Was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, January, 1857, from which time she has been faithfully devoted to her religion.

She has faithfully and efficiently served the community in which she has lived for nearly 27 years. In the capacity of midwife with marked success; was noted for her composure and presence of mind, and for her strength of nerve and vitality. On the 5th day of April last she had the misfortune to fall out of a wagon when returning home from one of her patients, and received severe internal injuries, from which she never recovered. Her dying moments were cheered and comforted with the hope of eternal life, and the presence of her husband and children. She leaves a husband, 5 sons and 3 daughters living, (2 sons being deceased) 7 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Peace to her ashes, and a glorious resurrection.—[Com.]

Died at his residence in Farmington, Davis County, Utah, June 16th, 1879, of old age, HENRY CAL HIGHT. Elder Hight was the son of Caleb Hight and Katurah Horton. Born January 17th, 1810, in Windham, Green County, State of New York. He was one of the early western pioneers, moving from New York to northern Illinois, in 1837. In 1845 he moved to Nauvoo and joined the Church at that place. He was driven out with the saints, wintered on the Missouri River, following the pioneers, and arrived in Salt Lake Valley in September 1847, wintered in the Old South Fort, in Salt Lake City. In the fall of 1848 he settled at Haight's Creek, "Lace Side." He was a member of the 12th Quorum of Seventies; went on a mission to Denmark in 1853, returning in 1858; he has served as sheriff, assessor and collector, and was probate Judge of Davis County for three terms; he was also Captain and then Major of the Silver Guard.

He was appointed on a mission to the States in 1876, which he performed faithfully, returning in company with Elder E. T. Clark; since that time his health has gradually declined until his death.

He was a man of public spirit and enterprise, ever on hand to make improvement. Strictly moral and temperate, kind to the poor, just in his dealings, his whole life has been one of usefulness.

The funeral services took place at the meeting-house, on the 16th inst. A very large meeting of relatives and friends were addressed by Bishop H. S. Elder, J. T. Smith, E. T. Clark and T. Grover. He was interred in the cemetery at Salt Lake City, June 17, 1879.

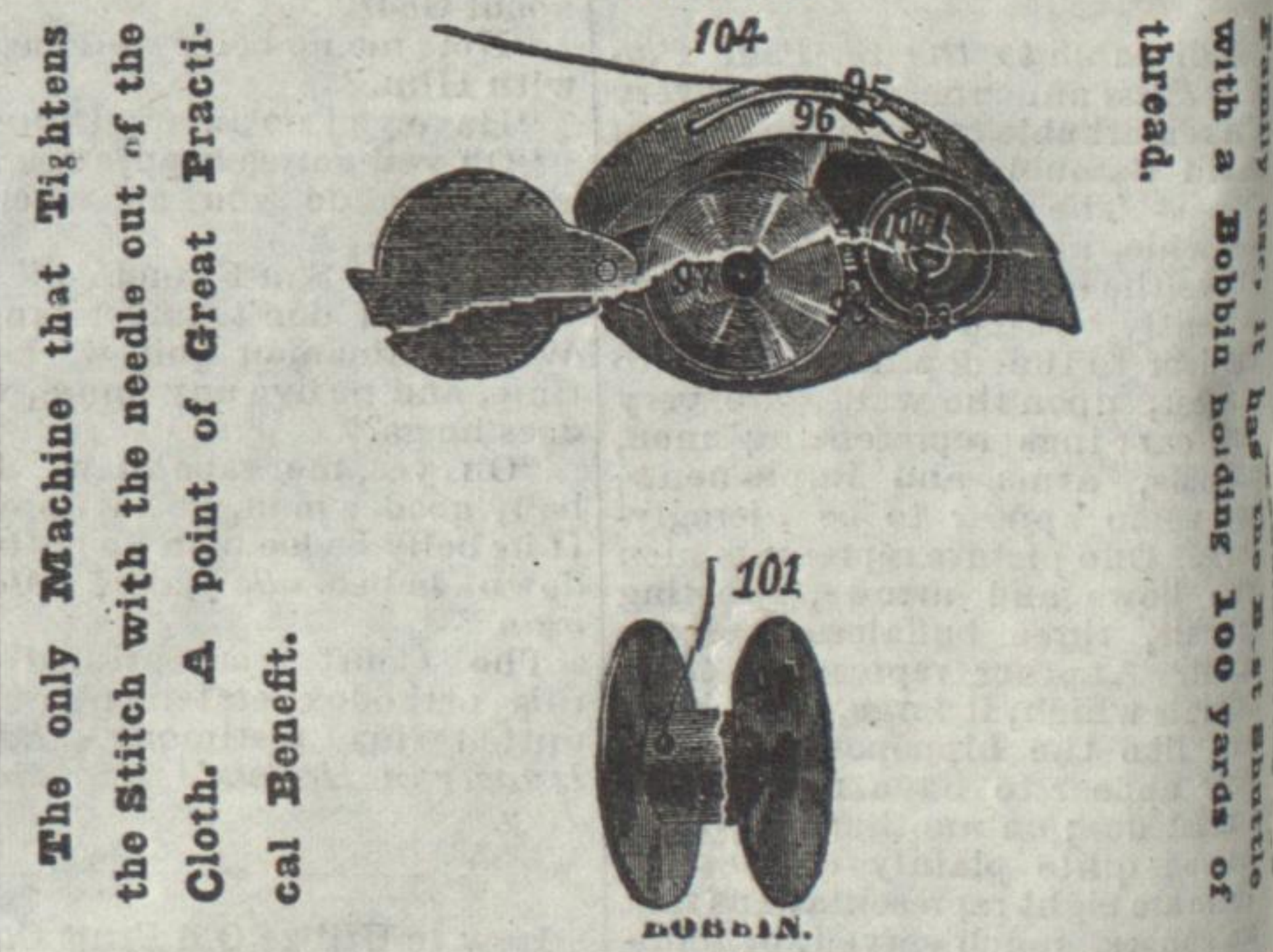
