UTAH COMMISSION.

The Resignation of the Members Said
to be Called For.

THE ALLEGED REASON GIVES

THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—In the Senate
the House of Representatives called
up a resolution directing the secre-
tary of the treasury to inform the Sen-
ate from what sources the gold coin of
this country, outside the federal
treasury, was increased to \$20,000,000
in the fiscal year last, as ex-
plained in his recent report for that
year.
