Pisces and Aquarius, now in viwe in the east, have no large stars, and consequently are somewhat difficult to pick out. Capricornus, near by, is also composed of small stars, but they are more happily grouped and are caslly recognized. The bright first magnitude star, Altair, in the con-stellation Aquila, will be found due north of the two stars at the extreme westerly end of Capricornus, while the

Calgary, Sept. 26 .- Back in 1896, when 49 Americans crossed over and settled in western Canada, there was nothing much in the fact to excite nothing much in the fact to excite contained by the second second second second second year their number was increased by 712, at least a few people on either side of the international boundary be-gan to realize that Western Canada had something to offer in the way of an inducement to attract the American former. In 1898, the sumper of imfarmer. In 1898, the number of im-migrants reached the surprising figure of 9,119, and the movement was on in earnest. Today, from that nucleus of 49 people, there has sprung up a mighty tide of immigration such as this continent has never known. Each year since 1896 has seen the numbers doubling and trebling, mouting up, until, with the close of the 12 months ending Dec. 31, 1905, a vast army of 107,000 Americans help to swell the grand total.

There seems to be no abatement in this movement, and it is confidently predicted that at least 150,000 to 200.-000 of our citizens will have crossed

000 of our citizens will have crossed the boundary this year and taken up homes in western Canada. The move-ment has now developed into a clear-ly defined plan of colonization, cen-iered about Calgary, southern Alberta. The reason for this enormous im-migration is easily given.
