Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

President Grant at Omaha.
OMAHA, 1. — President Grant,
Secretary Bristle and Belmont,
General Sherman and a number of
other distinguished gentlemen ar-
rived this morning from Des
Moines; they were hospitably en-
tertained by the citizens. A public
reception was held by the President
in the court room of the new cus-
tom house. The party left for
Colorado this p.m.

Will Pay Fifty per Cent.
NEW YORK, 1. — The agency
of the Bank of California here will
pay all the outstanding drafts of
the Bank, on and after to-day.
Disasters in the Pacific have
been received at the office of the
Direct Cable Company, in this city.
The steamer *Paradise* will
leave there on Wednesday to re-
pair the break in the cable; the
company state that there is no
truth in the report that an agree-
ment has been arrived at with the
Anglo-American Company on the
subject of the cable, the Direct
Cable Company maintaining their
entire independence; they will fix
their rate on re-opening.

CANADA.

A Marine Disaster—Drowned.
KINGSTON, Ont., 1. — The schooner
Porter is reported, having at
Nine Mile Point, with all hands
lost except the mate.

GASCO, Que., 1. — Nathan Hollo-
way, his wife, and Mrs. Snell were
drowned to day by the upsetting of
a boat while crossing the river.

WESTERN.

Recovering Evidence—A Giant Thief.
SAN FRANCISCO, 1. — An official
announcement is made that the
San Francisco Stock Board will
open for regular business next Tues-
day, at eleven a.m.; the Pacific
Exchange will resume at the same
hour. The Farmers' and Merchants'
Bank at Los Angeles, which closed
on the suspension of the Bank of
California, resumed to-day, and
Temple and Workman's Bank of
that city will probably be open to-
morrow.

It is now said that the pecu-
liations of Finney, the defaulting
clerk of the Navy Department, will
amount to over a million. Pay-
master Cunningham, entered upon
the duties of the office to day, vice
Spaulding, relieved. Spaulding
last night stated that the loss will
fall on individuals, and not on the
department; the Finney's fraud
consisted in fraudulently filling up
certificates for payment due on
contracts, which had been signed
in blank by Spaulding, and by
deceiving them to certain parties
with the notes of responsible parties
attached, and that the makers and
endorsers of the notes will be liable.
Nothing of the transactions until the
certificates were presented for pay-
ment.
