LOCAL BRIEFS.

State Board Meeting—Gov. Cutler and State Treas. Christensen went to Provo today to attend the regular monthly meeting of the state board of insanity.

Bringing Body Home—A dispatch received at the office of President Joseph P. Smith announces that Elder Jesse Beal, having in charge the remains of Elder Wallace L. Johnson, the young missionary who died in Albany, N. Y., on Monday, left Chicago last evening over the Burlington route. The journey from Denver will be made on the Rio Grande Western, and the body will doubtless be taken from the train at the point in Utah county nearest Linden, the home of Elder Johnson's parents.

Fined Six Dollars—Another man has been sent to the county jail for failure to obey the mandate of Justice of the Peace Durand of Murray. BLAME LAID ON CITY ENGINEER

Utah Fireproofing Company Says Kelsey Failed to Furnish Stakes.

OTHER SERIOUS CHARGES.

Claims That He Has Held up Estimates On Work Until There Is Due Nearly \$40,000.

At the meeting of the board of public works last night the Utah Fireproofing company submitted a communication in which it lays the blame for the slow progress in laying sidewalks upon the office of City Engineer Kelsey. The letter charges that the engineer has held up estimates on work done by the company until there is now due to it from the city nearly \$40,000. It is also charged that the engineer has harassed the company in its operations and that at the rate the stakes are now being furnished it will take the company five years to complete its contracts with the city.

MATERIAL SCATTERED.

The company secured the contract for sidewalks last year and on April 15, 1906, it was ordered to commence work on Second street. Such work was commenced on the following day, but on April 21, the city engineer ordered the work stopped and instructions given to commence on the walks on Ninth South street, as they had to be completed first. The move was made to Ninth South street, but there was a tie-up on June 21 because of the failure of the engineers to furnish the grade stakes. Two concrete mixers and gangs were then run until July 6, when one machine had to be laid off because of failure to furnish stakes. At one time while working on sidewalks, the letter states that the company had material scattered over about 40 blocks of the district.

ENGINEER TO BLAME.

A strong denial is made in the letter that the company desires to throw up its contracts and it states that if it desired to quit the city had violated nearly every section of the contract and the company would need no other excuse for giving up the contracts. The failure of the engineer to furnish grade stakes and to approve estimates on the work already done only tends to hamper the company and it has decided to continue the work merely as a matter of self-protection.

Thomas Owens, the manager of the company, was present at the meeting, but no action was taken on the letter at all by the board.

The board instructed P. J. Moran to commence the work of paying State street from Fourth to Seventh South streets at once.

ENCAMPMENT OF NATIONAL GUARD

The Boys Will Leave on Special Train Saturday Next.

COL. LUND TO BE IN COMMAND.

Believed That All the Horses Required Will be Secured by Tomorrow—About 3,000 Regular Troops in Camp.

The Utah National Guard special train Saturday will run through to Green River, Wyo., without regular stop after leaving Ogden, and supper will be eaten there. The troops will breakfast at Laramie Sunday morning, between 5 and 6 o'clock. Then the train will run to Lake Creek, 33 miles west of Cheyenne, and nine miles from the encampment, to which the Utah men will march, the cavalry and artillery and infantry staff officers being mounted. Col. H. M. Lund of the First Infantry will act as brigadier in command of the state troops, with this staff: Capt. O. H. Hassing, adjutant; Capt. W. H. Tobias, commissary; Lieut. C. D. Peck, acting camp quartermaster; Maj. W. G. Williams and Maj. Fred Kammerman will be in command of the battalions of the infantry, Capt. H. A. Barton will command the First battery and Captain W. Henry Shea will be in command of the cavalry troop. Dr. Herbert C. Deane, medical department, will be in command of the hospital corps.

Brig. Gen. Constant Williams, U. S. A., will be in command of the Camp of Instruction, with Col. J. A. Auger commanding the Tenth cavalry, and Capt. O. B. Meyer of the Fourteenth cavalry to assist him. The Utah troops will have 30 wall tents, 21 common tents, 42 cots for soldiers and five hospital tents. Thirteen Buzzard ranges will be required. Col. A. P. Kessler as state paymaster last evening, and it is believed that all the horses required will be secured by tomorrow about 3,000 regular troops in camp, including the entire Twenty-ninth infantry, entire Eleventh infantry, two companies of the Twenty-eighth infantry, six troops of the Fifth cavalry, headquarters and 10 troops of the Sixth cavalry, headquarters and 10 troops of the Tenth (colored) cavalry, Twelfth and Nineteenth light batteries, and a detachment of signal corps from department headquarters.
