### THROWN UNDER MOVING TRAIN. lic is invited.

Shocking Fate of James Lynch, a Young Tramp Who Was Stealing a Ride.

#### COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

A young man who served time at the city fall on the charge of vagrancy undor the name of James Lynch, but was released from custody Saturday, had both of his legs crushed beneath the wheels of a Rio Grande Western freight train early yesterday morning, and little hope for his recovery is entertained.

The story told by Lynch on his deathbed to Judge Howell and a stenographer was about as follows:

After being released from custody he met a man known to him as Dad Mur-phy, with whom he decided to leave the city. They accordingly went to the union depot yards, where they boarded a R. G. W. freight train out of Ogden. The brakeman came along and de-manded of them 50 cents each for their ride, but they refused to pay the amount, and watched their chance to get into a refrigerator car of the train, and hid in the end of it. After the train had started the brakeman came over car and fired a shot into it. the car and fred a shot into it. But missed the men. Lynch then crawled out on top of the car, when he met the brakeman, who scuffled with him, and threw him off, he falling between the wheels of the moving train, which passed over both legs, crushing them terribly. Lynch laid by the side of the track for about an hour, when No. 3 passenger came along and picked him passenger came along and precker him to Ogden. He was taken to the Ogden General hospital, where Dr. H. B. Forbes attended him. It was found that it would be bacessary to amputate both legs, but from logs of blood and terrible pain the from loss of blood and terrible pain the man had grown very weak, and it was thought best not to undertake the am-putation, unless he became stronger. He accuses the brakeman of being burtal, and the officers are looking out for him. Should Lynch die it is believed the brakeman will be arrested on the

charge of murder. Lynch, in his statement, said his name was not Lynch, and gave his cor-rect name, and the address of a sister to Judge Howell, but asked that his true name be not given out unless he should die, as he does not desire his sigter to learn of his sad misfortune unless it becomes absolutely necessary.
