Him Night of Tragedy, Arrested by Omaha Police.

WIFE GIVES STORY TO PUBLIC

Has No Theory as to Who Committed The Deed-She and Husband Were Happy.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 4 .- This afternoon the police arrested Miss Leona Bonnell, or Mrs. A. Rice, and will detain her at the city jail in connection with the murder at midnight, Tuesday last, of Dr. Frederick Rustin, No charge was placed against the woman,

but she has admitted she was the last person in the company of the physician before he reached his home on the fatal night, and she will be held for developments.

In a statement, Miss Bonnell told the chief of police that she accompanied Mr. Rustin within two blocks of his home after midnight on Tuesday. Miss Bonnell today stated her real name was Mrs. A. Rice, and that her parents and husband live in Des Moines. She has not lived with her husband for sometime, but is not di-vorced. She said that her acquaintance with Dr. Rustin extended over several months, but that she had known him only as any national word known a phy-

only as any patient would know a physician. The members of the coroner's jury went to the Rustin home today and viewed the remains and the surround-ings at the Rustin home. They will sleian.

hold an inquest Tuesday, when Mrs. Rustin, Mrs. Rice and several other witnesses will be called upon to testify. Chief Donahue today admitted that the suicide theory was no longer being considered, and said the entire energy of the police department had been en-listed in the work of tracing the mur-derer. Companies that carried insur-ance on the life of Rustin have taken a hand in the investigation and several private detectives are at work on the private detectives are at work on the

case. Seated in a room with the coffin containing the body of her dead hus-band, shot and killed so mysteriously while sitting on his front porch early Tuesday morning, Mrs. Frederick T. Rustin gave her first newspaper inter-view on the matter of her husband's death. Mrs. Rustin is bordering on collapse. collapse.

"Then I threw the door wide open and rushed out on to the porch and over to the chair in which he sat. "Oh, what is the matter, Fred? What has happened to you?" I ex-domed

What has happened to you? I ex-claimed. "'A man has shot me,' he mumbled, and then fainted. "My first thought was to get him in my arms and started, dragging him to-ward the door. He is a large, heavy man, and it was all I could do to carry him along. But I managed to get him man, and it was all 1 could do to carry him along. But I managed to get him just within the doorway, and then my strength failed me, and I was compelled to lay him on the floor and scream to my maid for assistance. "When the maid reached me she saw Dr. Rustin lying on the floor just within the door. That accounts for the wrests thesh have gone out that the

"Then we telephoned for physicians and for Mr. Rustin's mother. Mr. Rus-tin was taken to the hospital, and died an hour later. That is all."

"Why were the police not notified carlier?" was asked. Drug Co.

"I did not know of such "I did not know of such matters. My one thought was for my husband, and I never thought of reporting the matter to the authorities for some time. Then I spoke to the physicians about it, and they said they would attend to that point. But in the hurry of the operation which was performed they forgot to do so until after the death."
