Orders for Bonds Received by the Secretary at a Lively Rate.

THE INCOME TAX BILL FEATURES.

Young Men's Democratic Club Meeting.—Recruited Confirmed Chief Justice of Utah—Stevens Will Testify.

Washington, Jan. 18.—Now that Secretary Carlisle has taken action on the hard question there is a feeling of relief among the treasury officials, who have been viewing with uneasiness the increasing of the gold reserve.

Among the large crowd of callers on Carlisle today was a New Yorker who had come to announce personally that he was willing to take the whole \$50,000,000 bonds. A request for the same was referred.

This came justly that the \$50,000,000 offer was at the minimum price of \$17,000. There is still no doubt of the acceptance of this or a similar offer.

It is believed, from the orders already received, that the total revenue will aggregate nearly \$200,000,000, and the total will reach \$250,000,000, making practically last but not far off.

The issue for the present will be confined to disbursements of the \$20,000,000 coupon bonds and \$15,000,000 principal bonds, which will be issued in the month of March. In case of a general revenue arrangement will be made for \$500,000,000 required bonds.

The new sum of bonds will be received in gold. Estimates show that the national debt will be the same amount as New York city alone had before gold that the treasury of the United States, or rather that they must give gold.

Treasury officials who have taken the lead in the movement have called attention to the fact that during the residence of the Walker tariff in 1857 the revenue declined and a number of taxes and bonus issues were made to keep up the current expenses and pay mounting bonds.

THE INCOME TAX AGREED UPON.

Washington, Jan. 18.—The full text of the internal revenue bill including the income tax, has been agreed upon by the members of the ways and means committee.

The bill provides that the income tax shall go into effect January 1, 1886.

All classes of incomes are included in the measure, and a uniform rate of 2 per cent. is imposed on all incomes.

It is made obligatory on all persons receiving individual incomes of over \$2,000 to make a return of the total amount of internal revenue, and the tax is to be levied on those whose incomes are over \$1,000.

In case a person having an income of over \$2,000 fails to make a return, it becomes the duty of the revenue measure to make inquiry as to the exact amount due, and if the examination discloses that the income is \$2,000, the income is subjected to twice the ordinary tax, and the party failing to make return is deemed guilty of an offense and made subject to a fine of \$100.

Provision is also made by which no information can be made public as to the details of incomes reported by citizens. Any public or private person who divulges any part of the information contained in the measure is liable to criminal punishment, with a heavy fine and penalties.

Particular provision is made for the collection of the income tax, one on salaries, one on all incomes, but the former is to be collected by the postmaster, and the latter by the auditor of accounts, firm, corporation, etc.

The tax upon corporations includes every phase of corporate stock. This is general and without the power of exemption admitted to the industrial business.

The entire business of levying and collecting the tax is placed in charge of the deputy commissioner of internal revenue, who is to be appointed with definite compensation, with definite powers and who will exercise the right to require the collection of the income tax. The measure, as finally agreed upon, is a decided elaboration of the plan for an income tax proposed some months ago by Hall of Missouri.
