The recorder said that the mayor had done so, but that it had not been read, as the chief execu-tive had told him there was an under-standing between the councilmen and himself that the records should show himself that the records should show that the matter was referred to the committee on laws. This was the first the council members had heard of the matter and members had heard of the matter and nearly every one of them took a shy at the mayor and the recor-der. The recorder was sent down stairs after the records and produced the ve-to message; also the minutes of the meeting which had been approved a week ago. None of the councilmen at that time had noticed the incorrect manner in which this action was re-corded. The city attorney was ap-pealed to and he gave it as his opinion that the executive has no right to velo such matters; that the council could organize in such a manner as it saw ft. Caught in a Runaway Harvesting Machine and Life Crushed Out.

Spring City, Sanpete Co., Aug. 19.-James W. Crisp, one of our prominent citizens, was killed while at work on his farm near here yesterday. He was har-vesting wheat with a self-binder, and had stopped the machine during a thunderstorm. Joseph H. Puzey and Austin Erickson, hired hands, were with him. The men crawled under the machine for shelter from the rain, while machine for shelter from the rain, while Mr. Crisp stood in front of the horses to keep them from going. A loud clap of thunder frightened the team and they started to run. Mr. Crisp was caught in the machine and dragged about 50 yards. The large wheel passed over his left shoulder and chest near his heart. He was conscious and spoke to the men who were with him, but died

his heart. He was conscious and spoke to the men who were with him, but died in half an hour. The accident happened about 3 o'clock p. m. The body was brought to his home in Spring City and the coroner notified, as Mr. Crisp has the coroner notified, us Mr. Crisp has no relatives here. Upon investigation, it was deemed unnecessary to hold an inquest. Mr. Crisp was born Aug. 4, 1831, in Horsted, Norfolk, England, and baptized during the year 1866. He has lived in Spring City for over 30 years, and was a man who endeav-ored to attend to his own business, and let others do the same. The function
