WASHINGTON, 21.—The following circular announcing the death of Judge Black was issued from the State Department to day:

Department of State,  
Washington, 20.

The President directs the undersigned to perform the painful duty of announcing to the people of the United States, that Jere. S. Black, formerly Secretary of State, and distinguished by faithful services in various public trusts, departed this life on the 19th instant. As a mark of respect, it is hereby directed that the Department of State be closed on Tuesday, August 21st, the day of the funeral, and that the building be draped for thirty days, and flags be placed at half-mast until after the funeral.

SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—The majority of the striking operators requested to-day to be reinstated and were received. The same form of oath administered by the telegraph company east was taken here.

SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—Several accidents are reported in the conclave procession to-day. Three standard bearers fainted from exhaustion, and Sir Alexander Weed, aid to grand commandery of California, was thrown from his horse and had both legs broken.

LYNCHBURG, Va., 21.—At Ad-dington, on Saturday, Wm. Bridgman, a drunken white man, made an assault on a negro, whom he shot several times, and when Hawkins, the negro's half brother, remonstrated, Bridgman turned and killed Hawkins. The murderer is in jail. Serious threats of lynching were made by negroes.

BUFFALO, 21.—Wm. Barry and Charles Miller are arrested for the murder of the Swede, Nilson Odels, whose body was found at West Valley recently.

CHICAGO, 21.—A fire occurred at six this morning in the operating room of the Western Union Telegraph Company of this city. It is supposed from a defective flue. The floor of the room is very much burned and flooded by water. The company are now making all the wires duplex to New York and expect to be in order for the usual business in good season this morning.

WALL STREET, 11 a. m.—The suspension of Scott & Knight, bankers and brokers, No. 6 Wall Street, is announced. Both are members of the Stock Exchange. Liabilities about \$85,000. Stocks firmer Denver up to 28½, wheat ½ lower dull and heavy.

New York, 11.45 a. m.—At the stock exchange nothing is known regarding the failure of Scott & Knight, except by the special announcement. It is rumored on the street that the liabilities are much larger than announced.

New York, 21.—In regard to Scott & Knight's failure, it is stated that the firm never was considered a strong one. They were in trouble last week, but were helped over. The failure is ascribed to the recent decline in Denver and Reading stocks. No stocks closed out yet for their account. Stocks are steady to strong at present.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 20.—The House of Commons continued in session until 2.20 Sunday morning. The supply bill was finished, and the Irish tramway bill passed its third reading. The government assures Parnell and his followers of only £5,000 devoted to emigration purposes. The debate was very bitter throughout. In addition to Biggar, Call and Newdegate were called to order by the chairman.

Thirty-two persons died from cholera in Alexandria Saturday; one British soldier.

Archbishop Roger Beede Vaughn, Catholic, New South Wales, died suddenly in Liverpool yesterday, aged 49.

Wm. Writ Sykes, United States Consul at Cardiff, and husband of Olive Logan, died Saturday.

Rioting was renewed at Coal Bridge to-night. The police were attacked, whereupon the riot act was read and the police charged the mob. A number of Catholics severely beat two Protestants, one of

whom is lying in a serious condition. Fifty rioters were arrested.

One hundred and eighty-two deaths from cholera in Egypt Sunday, including four at Cairo, forty-three deaths from cholera in the provinces of Ghizeh and at Fe the last four days.

The Queen goes to Balmoral on Friday. Her health is much improved.

The Times Alexandria correspondent says: If the British troops should be withdrawn from Egypt, no European family would remain in the country a week after their departure. Egypt, he says is incapable of self-government.

The report that the bombardment of Hue had begun is denied. The French will for the present occupy the forts commanding Hue. It is said Harmand, the French Civil Commissioner in Tonquin, will bear an ultimatum to Anam, and if rejected, blockade will be proclaimed against Anam, and Hue bombarded. The French fleet will sail to reconnoitre Cochina China East.

A shooting affray occurred at Banbridge. A man evicted named Dennis Shaw has been arrested on the charge of having shot a policeman.

Paris, 20.—The doctors state that the end of Comte de Chambord has been rapidly approaching the last 24 hours.

Potsdam, 20.—The Emperor of Germany, accompanied by the King of Roumania, reviewed the guards here.

Dr. Gustav Wachergal, celebrated for his travels in Africa, has been appointed German consul at Tunis.

Madrid, 20.—Quiet having been restored throughout Spain, various bodies of gendarmes engaged in quelling the recent uprising are returned to their former stations. Provincial officials are actively inquiring into the causes of the rebellion. A document found on an insurgent who belonged to the Northern Army shows that the Masonic societies have been influencing the army since 1870. Among the documents is a circular issued by the Junta, issued from Paris on the occasion of the formation of the Dynastic Left, setting forth every contingency likely to arise. It was intended the first movement should be made in 1878, and another in 1891.

King Alfonso arrived at Barcelona to-day, and was cordially greeted by the people. Five subalterns were arrested here. Some government organs admitted that a crisis in the ministry is possible.

Rome, 20.—The Pope has written to Cardinal De Luca, prefect of the congregation; Cardinal Petta, Bishop of Frascati, and Cardinal Aegerothor, refuting the charges that the Papacy has any desire to stand in the way of the government of Italy.

Alexandria, 20.—Thirty-seven deaths Sunday, from cholera.

The report in circulation Saturday that there was a crisis in the cabinet, and that Riaz Pasha would form a new ministry, proves to be without foundation.

LIVERPOOL, 21.—James McDermitt, arrested here recently on his arrival with four Americans on suspicion in the dynamite conspiracy, has been further remanded. The prosecution will show that McDermitt, when in Cork, was in company with Featherstone, convicted among the dynamite conspirators.

Hon. Wm. Windom, ex-Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, has given a banquet to night. Several members of Parliament besides prominent Americans were present.

Two companies have been formed to effect the organization of a migration plan.

LONDON, 21.—After the result of the election at Sligo had been declared, O'Hara charged Sexton with resorting to vulgar personal abuse during the canvass and with slandering the living and dead. Sligo is illuminated in honor of Lynch's victory. Sexton denies that he used abuse.

The Times correspondent at Hong Kong reports that Haidoung in Tonquin was attacked by the French on the 19th; result not yet known.

The Standard Hong Kong correspondent asserts that the Chinese are in treaty with Germany with a view to purchase 100,000 rifles.

The Paris correspondent of the Times says the statement that Tryon would shortly leave for Japan is an admission of the suspension of negotiations between France and China. The return, says the correspondent, of Tryon to Japan, is evidently a device for getting him

away from Shanghai without the appearance of a rupture.

A telegram from Capetown says O'Donnell will be tried in England. He will be sent home immediately.

The ship Ellerman, from Hull April 24th, for San Francisco, was abandoned in a sinking condition off Cape Horn. The crew arrived at Montevideo.

One hundred and ninety-three deaths from cholera in Egypt on Monday.

Dublin, 21.—While a party of evictors in county Down were advancing toward Reesharve's house, a volley was fired at them, and a constable wounded in the abdomen and a policeman in the knee. Both men are in a dangerous condition.

Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, accompanied by Lady Spencer, has gone to Cork on a visit. Elaborate precautions are taken to protect them.

Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, arrived at Cork last evening. He was escorted through the principle streets of the city by a small mounted guard. He was respectfully received by the people and policemen in sight of each other, guarded the train of the Lord Lieutenant along the route from Dublin to Cork.
