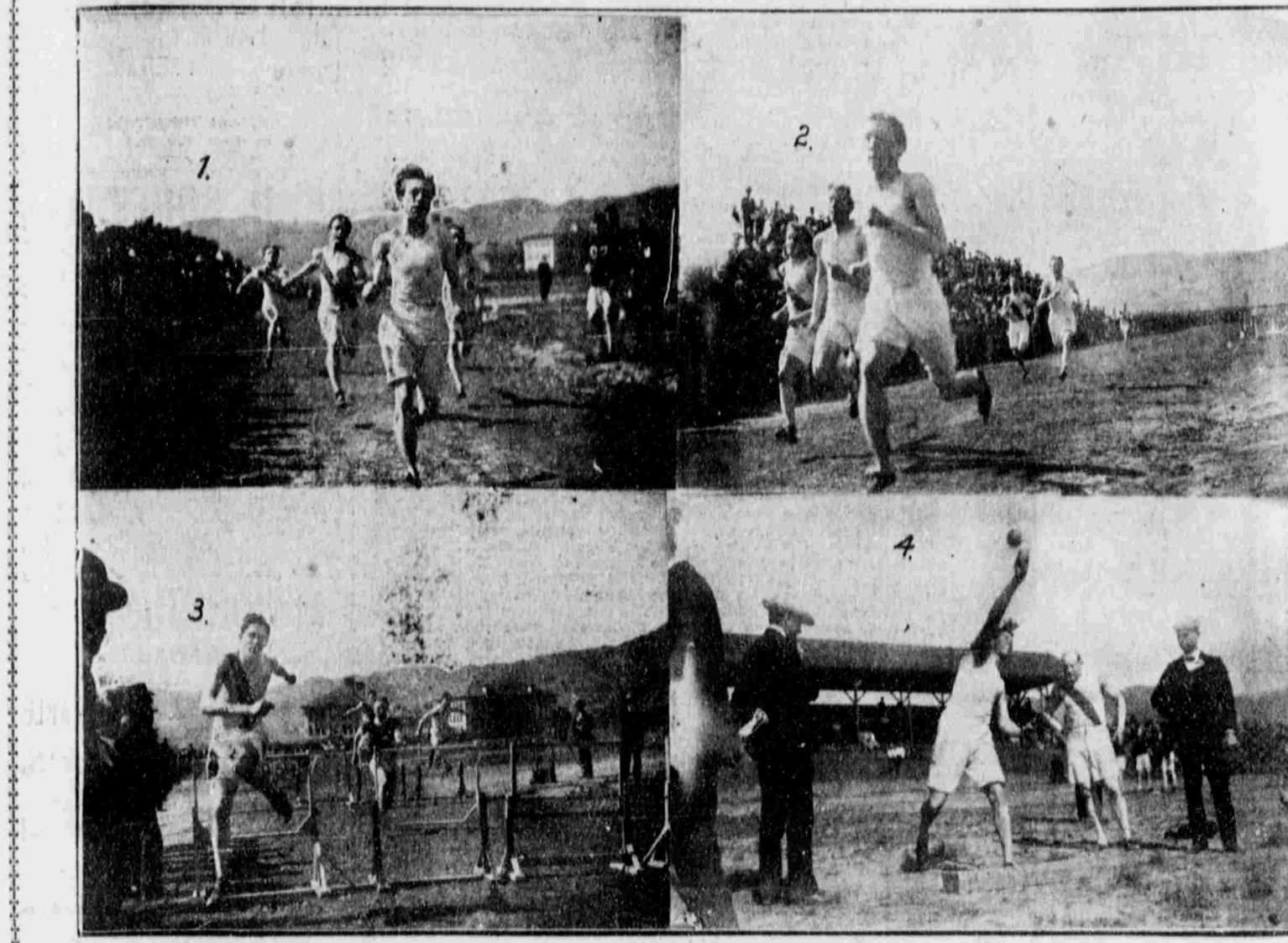

SOME STIRRING FEATS OF SPEED AND STRENGTH.

Illustrated Story of How Utah Downed Colorado in Saturday's Athletic Meet.

Cut No. 1.—Young Whitney making a sensational finish in the 100 yard dash, equalling his own state championship record of ten seconds flat. No. 2.—Whitney coming in first in a spectacular burst of speed in which he broke the state record in the 220 yard dash, covering the distance in 22 seconds flat. No. 3.—Rice of Colorado winning the 120 yard hurdle. No. 4.—Bennion putting the shot. These pictures were taken for the Deseret News by Fries, staff photographer, with the new focal plane shutter, the only one in the intermountain country. The pictures were taken in one one-thousandth of a second.

University of Utah track team defeated the Colorado College team Saturday afternoon on the Varsity campus by the score of 66 to 51. Seidem, indeed, are teams so evenly matched as were the contestants in Saturday's meet. Not until the last event was run could the winner be decided, and then victory beckoned to the sturdy athletes of the U. of U.

The relay race, a distance of one-half mile, decided the dispute, and when Captain Riddout dashed across the line a winner by a good margin, winning nine points, there was a mighty shout of approval from the "U" rooters. Could Colorado have done as well in this event as they did in the others, the result would have been different. The spectators numbered only about 50, and the performance of the athletes was worthy of a far greater audience. It was one of the best and most interesting meets ever pulled off here. Nearly every event was hotly contested; four state records were smashed, and two more equalled.

One of the exciting features of the day was the remarkable run made by young Horace Whitney in the 220 yards dash. This champion sprinter covered the distance in 22 seconds flat, breaking the state record, and going at a rate of 100 yards every ten seconds. Nothing short of this wonderful burst of speed could have won the event, as Painter, the Colorado sprinter, crowded Whitney pretty closely. Whitney equalled his previous record of 19 seconds flat for 100 yards.

The first event of the meet was the 120 yard hurdle. It was captured by Rice of Colorado in 15 seconds. Park, of the local team, got second. One of the prettiest events of the day was the 100 yards dash, the event being taken by Whitney after a stubborn fight with Painter of Colorado, who got second over him.

The state record for the hammer throw was smashed by Fred Bennion. The big man made four trials, and in each he outdistanced his rival. He broke the hammer 134 feet 7 1/2 inches. The half-mile race was won by Jimmy Wade. This fast sprinter had a hard time in beating Millard of Colorado, who got second over him after an exciting struggle.

After an exciting struggle, the shot put, making 35 feet and 3 inches. Hebborn, of the visitors, took second, with 36 feet and 11 inches. Then came the 220 yards event, already mentioned.

Russell took the pole vault, making a mark of 10 feet 7 inches, but it is generally conceded that he cleared the bar by a good foot.

How created a great deal of comment by his splendid performance in the 220 yards hurdle, an event which he won handsily.

The record for the 400 yards run was lowered a fifth of a second by Riddout. He took the lead on the signal to go and was never headed in the race. Painter and Rice of Colorado took the 800 yards event, the broad jump, with apparently little trouble. The best of the "U" boys could do in these events was to come third place. Wade won the mile race by a lead of 20 yards, making the mile in 5:40.

Fitt, Moore, Whitney and Riddout, composed the relay team. The event for half a mile, was run in 1:34. This event was won by the Varsity and won the meet.

It is interesting to note the records made by the big college teams in Saturday's game. The interstate meet in which Yale, Harvard and Pennsylvania competed, and compare their marks with those made by the U. of U. and C. C. athletes in the meet at the Varsity campus on Saturday afternoon.

It is a singular coincidence that Schick of Harvard and Whitney of Utah, were again tied in the 100 yards dash. In the event of a week before, both ran the distance in 10 seconds flat. In Saturday's meet, the result was exactly the same.
