

HIT HER WITH A BAR OF SOAP

How Matthew Gilby Denies His Wife's Requests For Assistance.

LATTER SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Janette Stiefel Charges Her Husband With Striking and Kicking Her.

According to a complaint filed in the district court today, Matthew Gilby has a very peculiar and strenuous way of denying the requests of his wife, Christine Gilby, for assistance. Mrs. Gilby alleges that in November, 1901, she asked her husband for sufficient money to purchase a pair of shoes for herself, and he denied the request and commenced to call her vile and abusive names and wound up by hitting her in the face with a bar of soap.

On another occasion in October, 1904, plaintiff asked her husband to help her clean out the stove pipe, which was out of order, but instead of complying with the request, she claims that he took a bucket of cold water and threw it on her. In view of the instances of cruelty cited plaintiff asks for a divorce and for half of the real and personal property owned by defendant. Of the property value of about \$5,000. They were married in this city on Aug. 19, 1897.

A CRUEL MONSTER.

Mrs. Janette Stiefel filed suit for divorce in the district court today against Alfred Stiefel on the ground of cruelty. They were married in this city on Dec. 22, 1892. Plaintiff alleges that in numerous occasions defendant has struck her in the face with his fists. On Jan. 15, she charges that he struck her with his fists and knocked her off a sofa and into the floor. On two occasions she charged him with having kicked her and in one instance he kicked her in the side, inflicting injuries from which she still suffers. She also alleges that he frequently left home without cause and stayed for two weeks or more without letting plaintiff know of his whereabouts. She asks for the custody of their minor child, for \$75 as attorney's fees and for costs of suit.

TWO TO ONE.

Proportion of Births to Deaths During The Week—Measles Prevalent.

The report of the city board of health for the week ending March 18 shows 22 births, of which 19 were males and 12 were females. Deaths for the same period number 11, of which seven were males and four were females. During the week there were 11 cases of smallpox, 2 cases of diphtheria, 41 cases of measles, 1 case of chickenpox and 1 case of whooping cough reported to the health office.

TO ENLARGE GUARD.

Officers Will Meet and Discuss Affairs To This End.

There will be a meeting during the coming week of the officers of the national guard in this city, with the brigade commander, to discuss ways and means for the growth of the guard during the ensuing two years. Committees will be appointed to handle matters by departments, and these will be made up according to the work they are specially to have in hand, with a view to expediting business as much as possible. There will be no perfunctory filing of reports, as it is expected that the committee can find time to shake them from the dust of the official pigeon hole; but reports will be largely verbal and immediate action taken.

POSTOFFICE BUSINESS.

Shows Gratifying Increase Notwithstanding Work of the Knockers.

The February business of the Salt Lake postoffice shows a gratifying improvement of 8 per cent over the business of the same month of the previous year. During last February the sales of stamps amounted to \$10,682.10; postal cards, \$500; stamped envelopes, \$4,240.74; second class postage, \$1,097.61; total, \$16,520.45. In February, 1904, the sales from stamps amounted to \$11,715.15; postal cards, \$557.50; stamped envelopes, \$4,314.53; second class matter, \$1,026.31; total, \$17,588.21; increase, \$1,217.76. Postmaster Thomas remarks that if the knockers will let up on the town there will be even a greater ratio of increase for next February.

At the session of the city council held on the 14th a petition was presented from the Utah Bottling company asking permission to tap the city's flowing well. The council refused to grant the petition.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Beck again presented their petition asking the city's aid in lowering their building to the level of the street grade. The clerk was instructed to write the county recorder and county surveyor to ascertain if the company had an established grade on the county road through Murray City.

Savage and White, managers of the Treadwell dance hall, asked the council to order the removal of the wagon moved from in front of their hall. This was also turned down. The going system which the marshal asked to be installed will cost \$25, according to the figures of the Independent Telephone company. The street committee accepted the 10 arc lights installed by Tripp. The clerk was instructed to have the city electric supply company asking it to rewire the street lights which it had put in with inferior quality of wire.

The city purchased 25 three gallon Under Writer fire extinguishers at \$13 apiece. Ordinance of chapter 25 regulating the speed of automobiles in the city limits at eight miles per hour and four miles per hour over crossings was read the second time. Two hundred and fifty dollars in bills were allowed.

NARROW ESCAPE.

David Mawson, a young man living on Third East, near Fourteenth South, had a narrow escape from being killed on Wednesday last. He was driving a car on the road in a light buggy, the shaft of which was broken and had been bound with wire. In some way the wire became unfastened, and he was thrown from the car, striking his head on the ground. Friends came to his aid and after picking him up he was taken to Murray where Drs. Olsen and Bird dressed the wound.

TO INCORPORATE BINGHAM JUNCTION.

A meeting was held last Monday night in the schoolhouse at Bingham Junction by the old committee, which was appointed two years ago to look into the possibility of incorporating the place as a city. The committee consists of 15 of the most prominent business men of the Junction. It was resolved at this meeting to call a mass meeting of the citizens on Monday night, when the matter will be fully presented to the people. It is the intent of those at the head of the movement to try and incorporate the whole of the Twenty-seventh school district.

JORDAN CITY.

It is plainly evident and can be taken as a foregone conclusion that if the people vote in favor of incorporating the new city will be named Jordan City.

AN IMPORTANT CENTER.

The present population of this thrifty little town is about 2,500, making it an important center. Lying as it does on the main line of the Rio Grande Western railway, and at the junction of the branch line which connects with Bingham city, it naturally draws considerable business there. Besides this there is located at this place the United States and Bingham smelters, the former with a pay roll of \$45,000, and the latter \$23,000 per month, making a total of \$68,000 paid out in wages each month. The present revenue is between \$13,000 and \$14,000 per year, which is equal to the revenue of Murray city. When Murray was incorporated its revenue was \$10,000 per year, which, compared to the revenue now collected at Bingham Junction, shows the possibilities there are of incorporating that place.

FIRE AT SANDY.

Last Saturday evening the people of Sandy were startled by the cry of fire, and were shocked to learn that the beautiful home of August Nielson was burning to the ground. The neighbors lent all the assistance that was possible, but it was of no avail for the water supply in Sandy is limited to the surface wells, and soon the well on the Nielson place was pumped dry and the fire was left to burn itself out. It was about 8:30 in the evening when a blaze was discovered on the roof of the house, and before water could be dashed upon it the flames had enveloped the whole house. The family was able to save but little furniture, and the total loss will reach \$3,000. Kind hearted neighbors took the unfortunate family in and will care for them until further arrangements are made.

BASEBALL FOR MURRAY.

At a recent meeting of some of the leading citizens of Murray, an association was formed to be known as the Murray Athletic association, with L. C. Miller, president; G. W. Churches, secretary, and F. Bink, treasurer. These, with J. W. Cahoon and John Birch, form the board of directors. The association is to have a capital of \$1,000, divided into 100 shares, and the same are being sold to the merchants of Murray. Not more than one share can be held by any one party. A five-year lease has been secured on a strip of ground just west of the Miller-Cahoon lumber yards, where the association is erecting a grand stand and is leveling and fencing the ground. The association has secured the services of Ernest Heusser, a prominent young gentleman of Murray, who has won considerable fame in the baseball line the past year. It was Mr. Heusser's admirable work in the box last season that won for the local team so many important games. The last game of the season with the Eureka boys, who then held the amateur championship of the state, was the most important of all and the victory won in this game seems to have given the local team fresh courage.
