In this chief city of the Saints, the mammo'h ball of the Theatre was the most attractive of the varied scenes of amus ment. It was a grand affair, as, all will testify who were present and participated in the festivities.

In addition to the reports of the doings of be. the saints on that day in various places which we publish, others equally as interesting and worthy of note have been received, which unavoidably have to be tabled, for the want of Mexico. dated Oct. 30, 1861, or that dated August 9. Among the communications thus laid over are those from Plain city, Richmond, American, Fork, and Nephi, which came to hand later than the others. In each of those places, the doings were on a grand scale, and of an interesting character, as in many re-pects they presented some new things, and were not altogether imitative in detail, nor monotonous in description.
