Serial Combat Between State Troops
and a Gang of Outlaws.

NO MORE DESERT FAILURES.

A TRIFECTA DEAL.—The Stock Market.
A Supreme Court Decision.
The World's Fair.

ASHELAND, Ky., July 21.—A report has just been received from Wise county, Va., that a fight took place last Wednesday at that county between state troops and Fleeman's gang of outlaws, in which four soldiers were killed and six outlaws mortally wounded.

For several months the Fleeman gang, now 12 number, have been wanted very badly. They are accused of participating in a triple murder recently committed by the same persons who captured and hung two men in the crime. Two weeks ago the government sent a company of state soldiers to assist the sheriff in arresting the outlaws. Last Wednesday the soldiers overcame the gang at a house near Ashland. Five soldiers were killed and six mortally wounded. Oliver Fleeman was also killed and dying.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

Interest Continued in General Electric.
A Trifecta Feeling.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The interest in stocks at the opening continued to general electric which started at 49, advanced to 45 and closed at 45 in the new market. Standard & Poor's average index ended at 264. The others were steady.

Last, on the announcement that money for the American dividend had been deposited in nearly a month, general electric advanced to 49. It has since closed at 45 and is still up. The market is still in a state of waiting to see if it will reach a climax of fluctuations in the course of the day.

The market was definitely weak after it closed, but its vigor which dropped to 27, as the reported changes in the market of new sugar, general electric declined to 44, coal, gas and oil to 263, and the market improved. At noon the market was weak.

A MINNESOTA BANK FAILS.

MILWAUKEE, July 21.—The Commercial Bank has failed.

The bank belonged to A. H. Gottsch, the cashier, who had a fund of a million dollars and fifty thousand.

The secretary replied that Green Bay was seriously interested in the financial arrangements, and said the government was still in communication with France. No geographical limitations were yet laid down.

Some Checks on the News.

INDIA'S FINANCIAL POLICY.

CALCUTTA, July 21.—The exchange banks have for the present refused the offer of the Indian government to purchase silver coined after the standard of the British pound. It is understood the banks will negotiate with the mint to mint coins in any manner or for any purpose so as to suit the interests of the government.

In addition to this, gold coins have been issued and are now offered for sale, the expenses of paving, sewer, and other improvements made are also to be met.

The law of Congress reads:

"That no political or municipal corporation, society, or other subdivision in the United States shall be compelled to receive or become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to any amount in the aggregate, including existing indebtedness, exceeding one per centum of the value of the taxes levied within such corporation, society, or subdivision, to be accounted for the last preceding year, and the amount of such indebtedness, which the city may incur.

Upon this showing the city has already exceeded the limit of its indebtedness.
