The treasury is facing the crop mov ing season very well equipped with government notes, but under some pressure in regard to supplying the large volume of new bank notes which have been applied for under the gold standard law. The probability of a heavy demand for notes was antici-pated early in the winter. Precautions were taken to print a large stock of silver certificates of the denomination of \$1 and \$2, and United States notes of larger denominations. Treasury notes issued under the Sherman law are no longer being printed in ac

cordance with the mandate of the gold standard law for their gradual retirement. As a result of the precautions taken early in the winter it has been possible to reduce the printing of gov-ernment notes somewhat and to put the force of the bureau of engraving and printing more largely on to new bank notes. It is proposed after this week to begin work upon the new sil-ver certificates for \$5 for which the de-


