

# PREVENT CRASH

They Threw Twenty Millions Into Market to Save It.

CALL MONEY WENT TO 20.

Stocks Poured Upon the Market and Prices Went Lower and Lower -

Some Support Given.

(Special to the "News.") New York, Sept. 29.—Call money opened at 15 per cent and as the demand was light this helped the market somewhat. A crash due to the slump in Louisville & Nashville was prevented by J. P. Morgan & Co., who put \$20,000,-000 into the market, including the \$5,-000,000 anticipated dividend on United States Steel shares. Louisville & Nashville lost over 7 points; friends of J. W. Gates were seriously hurt. The slump was due to a fear that Mr. Morgan would not exercise his option at 150 on 206,000 shares deposited with him by Mr. Gates and Edwin Hawley. Few well informed men in the street believe however, that Mr. Morgan will take

such a course. New York, Sept. 29.-Free liquidation was in evidence in the opening dealings in stocks which was partially foreshadowed by a sharp break in prices of Americans in London this morning. It will be seen that all of the above were sold on the market with the exception of the item mentioned as shipped out in hands, which is of comparatively small amount, so that the demand might be said to have been right up to the supoly. In order to bring the demand up to this high water mark, however, was necessary for salesmen to make concessions of more or less extent on nearly all kinds of cattle, and as noted a week ago, the bulk of the decline fel on the poorer grades of stockers and

The run the present week has been smaller at around 79,000, including 8,500 alves. Trade has been handicapped calves. every day this week by a drizzling rain but in spite of this and the big supply there has been a freer movement than a week ago, and prices on nearly everything are a little better. Corn cattle have advanced 10 to 15 cents, and western beef cattle were 15 cents higher up to last night. Top beef cattle brought \$7.75 this week, Monday, and some westerns, weighing 1,198 brought \$5.50 yesterday. Some high priced feeders that went out 90 days ago came back this week, and sold at \$6.75, scoring a good profit. 
